GOSSIP-GRAMS

News and Views on Air Personalities

WHEN the "Hour of Charm" program took the air for its weekly broadcast on Sunday evening, September 1, the regular "House of Magic" feature yielded to the vital topic of National Defense as Charles E. Wilson, able president of the General Electric Company, sponsors of the show, discussed briefly the necessity for immediate cooperative action on the part of all types of business and industry in the current defense plans.

AS the cry "Play Ball!" resounds over the diamond for the first game of the 1940 World Series—the thrilling, colorful spectacle of baseball's classic will be described for a nationwide audience by outstanding sports announcers. Mutual Broadcasting System officials will soon name the men who are to present this exclusive coverage for them. "We will do everything possible to select the most talented announcers," said J. P. Spang, Jr., president of the Gillette Safety Razor Company, recently, in accepting the sponsorship again of the World Series \$100,000 was paid to organize baseball for the broadcasting rights.

Sheets of seals have been sent out and returns will very soon begin to come in.

One half of the money made by the seal sale remains in the county for local use, 45% is sent to the Oregon Tuberculosis association to help care for our state institutions and 5% of it is sent to the National Tuberculosis association.

The Washington County Public Health association has various uses for this money. The county health officer and nurses give tuberculin skin tests to children all over the county by serving the 104 elementary schools, nine high schools and several parochial schools. They also hold clinics in the health offices each Saturday morning for those they do not reach in grade children who need dental care and whose parents are not able to provide for it.

Other ways. When children are found who react to the tests, they are X-rayed to determine whether they have an active case of tuberculosis. Active cases are referred to a sanitarium when possible. Otherwise arrangements are made for their care elsewhere.

Other activities of the organization consist of providing for the vocational training of patients in tuberculosis hospitals who have been sent there from Washington county. For those who wish to become self-supporting in some work suited to their abilities after their release, help is provided.

This year the Public Health association is conducting a county-wide dental clinic for all 1st
