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Meetings, Elections For Leaders Set

Community committee officers for 1941 for the Agricultural Conservation program will be elected at a series of eleven meetings scheduled for Washington county next week, according to an announcement from the local county committee. John W. Kamna, chairman of the Washington county group, states that at these meetings there will be discussions of the 1940 program, the activities of the local association during the year and a presentation of the 1941 tentative program.

Chairman of the local community committees will preside over the meetings. Assisting will be Mr. Kamna, A. E. Kralmer and R. Glen Ritchey, members of the county committee and Stan McClurg, assistant secretary of the Conservation association. "Farmers participating in the conservation program meet annually and elect by ballot the members of the committees who will carry on the program for the coming year," says chairman Kamna. "Washington county is divided into eleven districts or communities and it is important that farm operators attend the meeting for the district in which they live, according to the county committee. All the farmers listed on the program records are being notified as to the time and place of their community meeting."

Heads Up at Seven Down!

Not long ago, two pedestrians started to cross a busy thoroughfare in an Oregon city. It was dark, and as they left the curb, one noticed a car approaching. But still, apparently, half a block away. Deciding they had time to reach the center of the street before the car would reach the intersection, the pedestrians walked on, but before they had taken more than a or five steps, the car was so close they realized their lives were in danger. They darted back toward the curb, but the driver of the car, seeing them at that moment, swung his car in the same direction in an attempt to avoid hitting them. One was killed and the other seriously injured.

This accident is typical of the many pedestrian accidents in the state, according to Earl Snell, Secretary of State and sponsor of the state wide program for traffic safety, who today announced results of a pedestrian study made recently by the traffic safety division of the State Department.

This study disclosed that cars moving at 25 miles an hour cover ground five times as fast as the average pedestrian 35 years of age, six times as the pedestrian from 35 to 55 years of age and seven times as fast as the pedestrian over 55.

"The results of this study indicate clearly the danger pedestrians incur when they start across a street when they can see a car approaching from the left, especially at night," Snell declared. "Many persons simply do not realize the difference in the speed of an automobile and the average walker, if the car seems fairly well up the block they proceed in the belief it is not near enough to constitute a hazard. It was for the purpose of pointing out the difference in the rate of travel that our study was made."

In checking the walking pace of pedestrians, walkers were classified in three general age groups, those under 35, those between 35 and 55 and those over 55 years of age. Investigators checked the time it took these persons to walk across an intersection of a given width by means of a stop watch. By this means, the average walking rate, as expressed in feet per second covered, was determined. Pedestrians were timed at intersections controlled by traffic signals, at uncontrolled intersections and at different times and on different days.

In the age group under 35, pedestrians took from 11 to 23 seconds to cross a street, the average time for this group being 13.8 seconds. The average time for the age group 35 to 55 was slightly higher, 14.4 seconds, while the time for those over 55 years of age was several seconds higher, 19.1 seconds. Expressed in feet per second, the first age group walked at a pace of 7.17 feet per second, the middle group walked at a pace of 6.87 feet per second, while the older group proceeded at a pace of only 5.18 feet per second.

Compared to the pace of a car going 25 miles an hour, and covering 36.6 feet per second, it was found that the car traveled five times as fast as the younger pedestrians, six times as fast as the middle-aged group and seven times as fast as the older group.

The significance of these figures, Snell points out, lies in the revelation of the distance a car will travel while a person on foot is taking two or three steps. For the older group, for example, the study shows that while the average pedestrian was walking 15 feet, the car was traveling at the speed of (continued on page three)
