COUNTY GROWS ALBA VETCH SEED

the Willamette and alba vetch they must be produced under certification. While the acreage of the Willamette strain greatly exceeds the present acreage of alba, they probably will not long continue. Because of greater ease in identifying the alba it will probably, as seed becomes plentiful, largely replace the Willamette strain.

"Willamette vetch was first produced commercially in Washington county 1937", says the county agent. Practically if not all the seed supply shipped south last summer plus what was used for seeding nearly 14,000 acres in the Willamette valley this fall has developed from less than 10 acres in the summer of 1937. Alba vetch seed stock for the local acreage and what was sent out of the county has developed from a first planting of less than five acres and harvested in 1939.

The 3600 acres represented in the seeding of these two types of common vetch mean probably almost that much increase in the total acreage of legumes expected to be harvested for seed locally in 1941. Seeding of annual legume seed crops is now being completed. The exact acreage of Austrian peas and hairy vetch is not yet known but it appears to be certain that the acreage of hairy vetch seeded for the 1941 harvest is considerably larger than the approximate 2000 acres harvested in 1940. The Austrian field pea acreage for the Willamette valley as a whole will probably show some shrinkage. There may be some shrinkage in Washington county in the 1941 harvested acres as compared to the 1940 acreage but the decrease in this county will apparently be less than the percentage of decrease for the valley as a whole.

The rather abrupt expansion of the acreage of these crops in 1940 and the continuing total expansion for 1941 has been stimulated by the purchase program of the triple A. This program has established definite prices which have looked attractive to growers who have under their control, land that will produce satisfactory yields of these seed crops. Since the growers are annually becoming more familiar with the necessity of direct control measures and with harvesting procedures, these crops bid fair to hold a prominent place in the list of sources of agricultural income for this county.
