City Water Service To Be Extended

Two new faces will be seen on the City Council this year, those of J. R. Harris and Walter Van Kleek elected last month.

Mr. Van Kleek has lived here for years and years and is familiar with the growth and development of this section.

Mr. Harris came to Beaverton as a radio salesman and had a salesroom where the Beaverton Barber shop is now located. He disposed of his interests but after being away a few years he purchased the Alexander property on the north side of the Canyon road just east of Cedar street and began its development. He now has a considerable tract and has built a neat home and a lunch and ice cream place of business.

Of course Mayor Rossi is new to the Mayor's chair but he has served on the Council several years, and is familiar with the affairs of the Town.

At the Council meeting Monday evening of this week these officers were chosen for the next year by the new Council: Paul Patterson, City Attorney; Fred Goyt, General Superintendent; L. L. MacIntyre, City Engineer; A. L. Amacher, City Auditor; Fred Antrobus, Marshall; Archie Olson, Fire Chief; Dr. C. E. Mason, Health Officer.

The Council voted to buy three garbage cans from the Northern School Supply Co. at a cost of \$33.00. They passed a Resolution of appreciation for the work of retiring Mayor W. E. McCloskey, former Mayor Wilson and Councilman J. Kirby for the splendid work done by these officers.

USE OF LIGHTS IN TURKEY BREEDING

The use of artificial lights and smelter for turkey breeders will probably depend entirely upon the demand or sale of early hatching eggs and poults, as is stated in a report received in the County Agent's office from N. L. Bennion, Extension poultryman.

If a turkey breeder desires early eggs the hens should be exposed to artificial light for about four weeks before hatching eggs are desired and the toms should be exposed to this light for about eight weeks. Experimental work shows that toms respond to light much slower than the hens. Therefore, in order to obtain maximum fertility from early eggs, it is necessary to place the toms under light about four weeks before the hens. It is usually well to equip the lights with reflectors and place them from six to ten feet above the roosts in such a manner that the light shines on the roosts, watering devices, and at least, part of the feeders. One 50-watt light provides enough illumination for about 300 sq. feet of roosting space. Growers have found that providing a 13 to 14 hour day is sufficient.

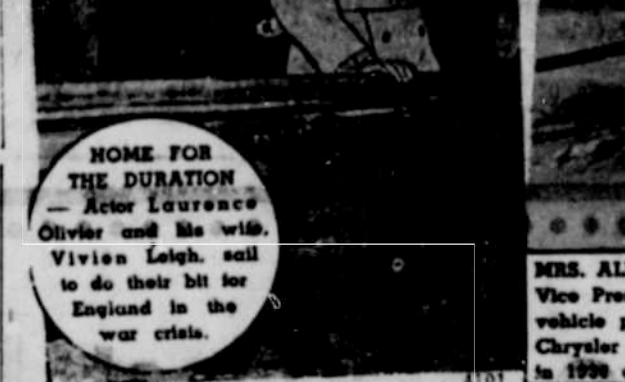
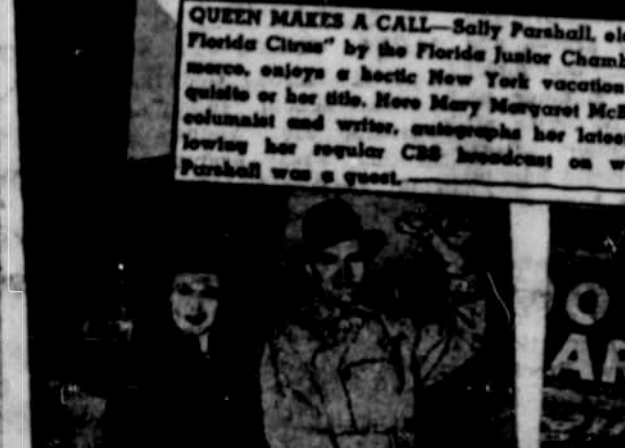

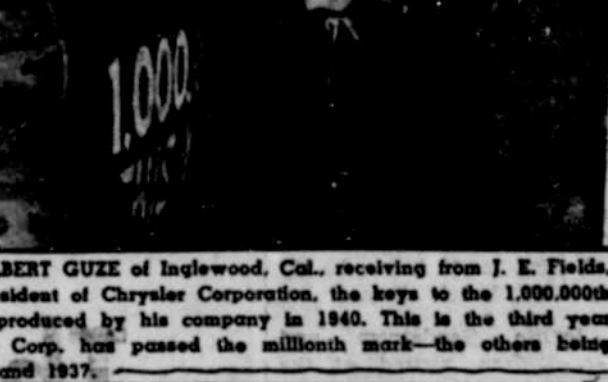

KIWANIANS HEAR ABOUT SAFETY

Earl F. Campbell of Traffic Safety in Portland talked on "Traffic Safety and Traffic Control" to the Beaverton Kiwanis at their regular meeting Wed. Jan. 8. He informed the Kiwanis that traffic safety was an attitude of the individual. He said that Portland had 18,000 accidents involving 34,000 autos in the year 1940 and that the percentage of Portland's registered autos was one out of every three. He said in that the population of Beaverton visited Portland often that they were in need of the same traffic education as Portland. Mr. Campbell told the Kiwanis that pedestrians wearing dark clothes at night should tie a handkerchief, or something white around the coat sleeve so that the motorists could see them against a dark background.

Organizations in Oregon cities and towns will send 4-man teams to Portland to compete in radio safety quiz programs during the year of 1941. It was disclosed today when Earl Snell, Secretary of State, and sponsor of the program, announced that the first teams to compete were the Portland and Salem Junior chambers of commerce. These teams met Thursday, January 2 at 9:30 o'clock in the evening in the KOIN studios.

The quiz shows will be broadcast from KOIN every other week as an added feature of the safety show, "Speed, Incorporated." The accident dramatizations which have been broadcast each Thursday will be continued, being presented every other week, alternation with the quiz show.

Questions used on this program will be two types, one set covering the safety situation in the cities represented in the broadcast—in the first instance, Salem and Portland—and the other set covering subjects of general safety interest. Included in the quiz will be questions on the accident experience in Oregon, as shown by statistical records; the rules and regulations pertaining to operation of motor vehicles in this state, and general principles of safe driving and walking.

The program is designed to stimulate and increase public interest in traffic safety and listeners are invited to submit lists of questions for the show. Questions may be addressed to Earl Snell, Secretary of State, Salem. Winning teams in the quiz will receive framed certificates of award, presented by the Traffic Safety division of the State Department.

Many Appear On Program At 4-H Club

The principal speakers for the second annual 4-H club leaders conference to be held in the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce rooms January 11, beginning at 10:00 a.m., include H. C. Seymour, state 4-H club leader, and Helen Cowgill, assistant state leader, both from Corvallis. They will discuss methods and opportunities in the 4-H club program as well as answer questions dealing with different phases of the work, according to an announcement made by Palmer Torven, assistant county agent.
