SCHOLLS VOTES LOR NEW DIAL SYSTEM

At a meeting held in Scholls Grange hall Saturday a large gathering of telephone users unanimously voted approval of a formal motion to endorse the proposals of the West Coast Telephone company for modernization of the Scholls telephone system. Walter Q. Orr presided. L. A. Gritten, district manager outlined the changes to be made. About March 1st, he said the old style "magneto" system will be replaced by a modern automatic dial system similar to that recently installed at Aloha, Banks, Amity and other exchanges.

When the changes now under way are completed, probably in the late summer, Beaverton, Aloha, Tigard, Stafford, Sherwood and Scholls will all have 24-hour automatic dial systems.

All lines and outside plants are to be rehabilitated. The telephone will be replaced with dial phones of modern type. Automatic switching machinery of latest type will be installed in the present building at Scholls.

Representatives of the Company are calling on the subscribers and nearly all of those so far interviewed have signified their intention to take the better grade of service and the meeting Saturday expressed its approval of the contemplated change.
