MANY OSC GRADS IN RADIO WORK

Alumni records in the school of engineering reveal that 53 graduates who have had practical training in radio communication in the KOAC physical plant here have obtained responsible positions in radio engineering work in the past three or four years. No laboratory is as useful or as valuable as one actually being used on the job, says F. O. McMillan, head of the department of electrical engineering and also supervising engineer for KOAC.

SHORT COURSE FOR ENGINEERS SLATED

The school of engineering here has been selected to give an emergency defense short course in aeronautical engineering to prepare men for work in airplane manufacturing plants.

As this is an advanced technical course, it is open only to men already holding an engineering degree.

The course is to continue three months with all fees and tuition of students accepted to be paid by the federal government. Those who complete the course successfully are guaranteed employment in the Boeing aircraft plant in Seattle.

A call has been issued to all engineering graduates of this or any other college to communicate with Dean R. H. Deaborn if they are interested. Time of starting the course will depend on how soon a minimum number of applicants are accepted.

CARS COLLIDE; ONE BADLY INJURED

The car in which she was riding, driven by her husband, collided head on with a car being driven by John R. Tomlin of Vernonia.



Seventy-five percent of the non-resident motor vehicle registered in Oregon during the year 1940 came from the three western states, Idaho, Washington and California. It was announced today by Earl Snell, secretary of state.

California led the list with 70,754 cars, while Washington sent 20,949 and Idaho contributed 4,596.

Total non-resident registration for the year was 127,941 vehicles, the lowest registration since 1936. In 1939, the registration totaled 149,502 vehicles, but the registration for 1940 is believed to have amounted to not quite half of the out-of-state cars actually visiting Oregon during the year. Many tourists did not bother to register their cars at all, it was pointed out.

Oregon drivers and pedestrians reversed the normal trend in traffic accidents during the month of December when fatalities were reduced 28 percent and the death rate, indicating the number of persons killed per 100,000,000 miles of travel, was cut 28.5 percent, figures compiled by Earl Snell, secretary of state, disclosed today.

Fatalities for the month totaled 43 against 43 for the same month in 1939 while the traffic death rate, considered the true indicator of the traffic situation was 15 persons killed per 100,000,000 miles of travel, compared to 21 for the same month a year ago.

December is usually one of the worst months of the year, so far as traffic accidents are concerned, Snell pointed out. hours of darkness, the emotional excitement prevalent around the Christmas holidays and the increased traffic of the holiday season all combine to increase driving and waking hazards during this month, he said.

In view of this fact, the traffic safety division of the secretary of state's office conducted an intensive drive to reduce accidents during the Christmas months and the results are highly satisfactory, it was declared. The actual reduction in the number of deaths is considered more significant in the light of an eight percent increase in the amount of travel in Oregon during the month.

NURSERY STOCK MAY BE SHIPPED

Fruit tree nursery stock and berry plants may be shipped in to Canada under the new Canadian war exchange conservation act, but all other plants, roots and bulbs, excepting nut trees about which there is yet no definite ruling, are excluded. This is the information that has been received by the Oregon Department of Agriculture.

Plants, roots and bulbs, for which orders were placed prior to last December 2, will be admitted, provided delivery is made on or before February 28.

Oregon bulb growers will miss the Canadian market as a quantity of bulbs, particularly, have been shipped into that country from Oregon.

HAS RENTED THE KIWANIS APARTMENTS
