Noted English Writer Asks Aid to Defend Homes Across the Sea

Great Britain's people know "the fight against world-wide tyranny and oppression is in their hands" and every bit of direct aid they can have from the people of the United States is of vital importance, according to Jan Struther, former editorial writer on the London Times and author of the best-seller, "Mrs. Miniver," now in this country. In a statement endorsing the work of the American Committee for Defense of British Homes, 10 Warren Street, New York City, which is seeking contributions of small arms, binoculars and steel helmets for use of British civilians in defense of their homes, Miss Struther said:

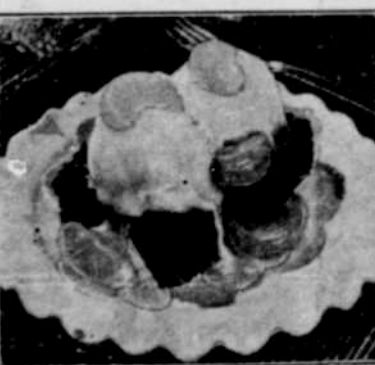
"The people of America for the most part do not quite realize what modern England is like. Many of them still think that it is a pre-1914 country full of rigid class distinctions. As a matter of fact, Great Britain has been changing a great deal during the last 10 or 15 years, and the present war has accelerated the changes. Great Britain is now probably the nearest approach to a true democracy that has ever existed; and its people know that the fight against world-wide tyranny and oppression is in their hands."

"In England today there is no longer the snobbery, the nonchalant muddling through which was supposed to characterize England's relations with the outside world in the past. And I believe that when this war is at an end we shall see a new England, purged and strengthened by the ordeal of war.

"Your country and mine are like two houses in a burning forest," Mrs. Struther continued. "At present the fire is raging round our house, and if you keep on handing us buckets of water as rapidly as possible we shall prevent it from spreading to yours."

"I understand, for instance, that there are 10,000,000 sportsmen and sportswomen in this country. It is to these Americans, whose homes and families are still comparatively safe, that I appeal to remember those homes across the sea which are in so much danger. Send them what weapons you can spare; send them in care of the American Committee for Defense of British Homes and trust that they will be used to such advantage that you will never be compelled to defend your own homes with your backs against the wall."

Budget Dessert With Canned Mandarin Oranges

1 1/2 cups Mandarin Orange Sauce
Cut chocolate cake with a large round cutter, or into rectangular pieces. Place cake on serving plates. Top each piece with ice cream; then pour Mandarin Orange Sauce over each portion, and serve at once. Makes 6 servings.

Mandarin Orange Sauce
1 can (11 oz.) mandarin oranges, drained
1/4 cup sugar
1 tsp. cornstarch
1/4 tsp. salt
1 cup mandarin orange syrup, drained from fruit
1 tbsp. butter
1/4 cup water
Combine sugar, cornstarch and salt; add syrup and water slowly, and stir until smooth. Cook over direct heat, stirring constantly until mixture thickens and becomes clear. Remove from heat; add butter, and mix well. Add mandarin oranges, and set aside to cool. Chill thoroughly. Makes 1 1/2 cups sauce, enough for 6 servings.
