What does the R.A.F. think of the planes America builds for them? Quentin Reynolds wanted to find out for Collier's, so he went right to Lord Beaverbrook in England and asked. His answer, as quoted in the Collier's article was:

"They are magnificent aircraft. Come and look at them. Talk to the pilots. Fly in them yourself. Go to the factories where they are assembled and tested."

Mr. Reynolds did. And here is a typical excerpt of the favorable report he obtained on all sides:

"When there is the Curtiss P-40, which will soon be as well known in England as the Spitfire, it is known as the 'Tomahawk'. It is a pretty lass, somewhat on the lines of the Spitfire. It has a long nose, and it is a sleek, imperious-looking creature. The Tomahawk has the liquid-cooled Allison motor. It is no secret among members of the aircraft industry that there were several 'bugs' in the Allison. One by one they have been eliminated. Today the Allison ranks with the Merlin, which has always been considered the best liquid-cooled motor in the world. The success of the Spitfire and Hurricane proves that point.

"I watched a test pilot put a Tomahawk through its paces. He did something I've never seen done with a Hurricane or a Spitfire—he climbed the Tomahawk almost vertically.

"How do I like it?" the pilot exploded when he landed. "How could anyone fail to like it?" It's a grand airplane. I've flown all of the fighter aircraft and in a combat I'd rather have this than any. It is more maneuverable

than a Spitfire. It isn't quite so fast as a Spitfire but what is?" "American aircraft, good only for training? England wishes she had five times as many as she has."

### SAFE —MAYBE!

It's only human nature to think that our property and our lives are in small danger from fire, the great killer and destroyer. So, many of us defer taking simple "anti-fire" precautions. In this case, putting off until tomorrow what should be done today, is safe — maybe. And that's a very important "maybe" indeed. Fire isn't considerate enough to warn us of an impending visit. It mails no advance notices. It strikes when we least expect it — and often it strikes at night. If it finds us ill prepared, it enjoys a grim field day of destruction. Perhaps your've seen homes and factories burn. You've seen walls fall in an inferno of smoke and flame. You've seen costly possessions and irreplaceable keepsakes reduced to worthless ash in a few minutes.

Possibly you've seen helpless people trapped floors above the ground, waiting in panic at windows for aid that may or may not come.

You're lucky if that hasn't hit you. But there's no guarantee that luck will go on indefinitely.

You and yours may be next on fire's long list — unless you take those precautions that will make your property safe. Nothing offers greater potential dividends than fire prevention.
