SHIP RAMS FREE FROM NEW ZEALAND

Sheepskin and agricultural leaders were on hand recently to view arrival in Salem of two Romney-Marsh rams imported from New Zealand for Clarence Bishop of the Pendleton Woolen Mills. Bishop purchased the rams for breeding purposes, with, of course, the wool production uppermost in mind in his choice of breed.

The rams, one and two years old, are the second Romneys imported into the Willamette valley from New Zealand. They were selected for Bishop by Prof. J. F. Wilson, wool specialist at the College of Agriculture, Davis, Calif., while Wilson was in New Zealand this winter.

Among the sheepman on hand at the depot when the rams were unloaded was William Riddell of Monmouth, who brought the first Romneys from New Zealand into the Willamette Valley in 1904.

The rams were taken direct to Bishop's farm near Newberg.

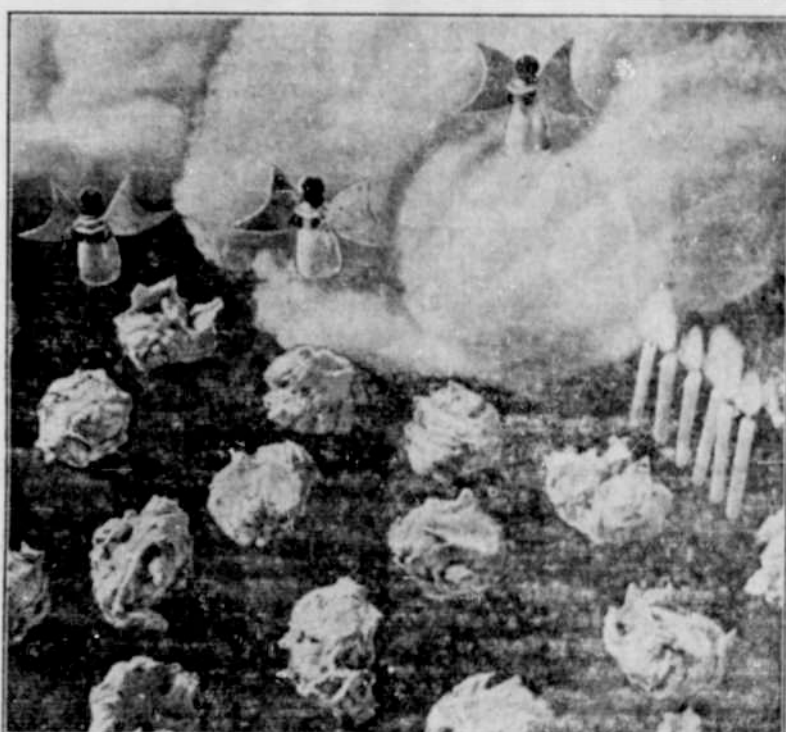

It's Delightful - Delovely -- Divinity!



YOU'LL think you're in heaven when you taste this made-to-Christmas-order candy, fitten food for angels and poor mortals alike. Coffee lends its flavor to this out-of-the-ordinary divinity, and the result is out of this world. Clip this recipe, by all means, for a holiday candy that approaches immortality:

Coffee Divinity
2 cups sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup double-strength, freshly-made coffee 2 egg whites
1/2 cup white corn 1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Combine sugar, coffee and corn syrup in a saucepan. Cook, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved. Continue cooking without stirring until a firm ball is formed when a small amount is dropped in cold water or (265° F.) registers on the candy thermometer. Remove from heat. Add salt to egg whites and beat until stiff, slowly add coffee syrup beating constantly. Continue beating until candy will hold its shape. Add vanilla and chopped nuts. Drop from spoonfuls onto waxed paper or turn into an oiled pan and cut into squares. Makes 1 1/4 pounds.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

USING THE SMALL CAMERA



The organ-grinder's monkey—snapped on the street with a miniature camera. Carry a small camera in your pocket—you'll reap a reward in interesting pictures.

TO get the most fun and benefit from photography, you should have a camera that you can keep with you at all times. Such a camera will enable you to seize upon a picture chance wherever you observe one—and, at the same time, having the camera handy will keep you alert, so that you actually observe more snapshot opportunities.

Up until a few years ago, most cameras were relatively bulky; but that is not the case today. Modern folding cameras, even those taking rather large-sized pictures, are relatively compact; and many miniature cameras are so small and neatly built that they can be carried in a pocket or woman's purse without the least inconvenience.

The miniature camera is an ideal choice for "everyday" use. It need not be an expensive model—in fact, it may be that a very inexpensive one will cover your needs. The chief advantage of the medium-priced and finer deluxe cameras in this class is that they have fast lenses and fast shutters, so that pictures can be taken under adverse light conditions. Many of the better models can also be used for picture-taking in full color—an extremely valuable feature.

If you buy a camera for pocket use, plan to keep it with you constantly—not just on weekends or during leisure hours. Take it with you to work. Watch for subjects on the street—such as the organ-grinder's monkey above. Carry the camera when you go for an afternoon walk. You'll get many an excellent picture, by this practice, that would otherwise be lost.

For everyday shooting, in black-and-white, load your "miniature" with a fine-grain panchromatic film, and your good shots will yield superior enlargements. If your camera is a de luxe model with ultra-fast lens, load it with a high speed panchromatic film; then you can get night snapshots in any well-lighted room, and at many night sports events. And don't forget that you can make gorgeous color "shots" with it.

Make the small camera your "daily notebook"—use it to jot down the things you see in the everyday round. Street scenes, oddities, amusing occurrences, snapshots of friends—these and many other types of pictures can be captured quickly with the pocket camera, and they'll add interest to your snapshot collection.
