FULLY PREPARED

During the last World War nation sound advice when he said: "Let alone what is successfully done and interfere as little as possible with the present national processes." That advice applies even more forcibly to day, and particularly to one great industry which is much

in the public eye — light and power. This industry is prepared to do its full part in defending this country. The Northwestern Electric Company recently issued a leaflet which vividly illustrates the electric industry's state of preparedness. America has long had the greatest interconnected power system in the world. It was built entirely with private savings. Defense industries can be located almost anywhere in this country. Power can be moved to any production territory immediately.

Government, despite its vast expenditures for power projects to compete with private plants in recent years, has contributed little to this situation. Its transmission lines are sparse and scattered. They constitute less than 10 per cent of the country's total mileage. Municipal power systems are isolated and virtually defenseless against interruptions and power shortages. Their lines are confined to urban areas and do not extend into rural districts.

In other words, private industry is responsible for 90 per cent of all the high-voltage lines in the nation — and private industry produces 90 per cent of all our electric power. Today, America has 4½ times as much power as in 1917 and you think private industry for that.

When you want a job done well, go to an expert. The private utilities are the experts

at the national power job — they have the resources, the men, the experience and the facilities. Not a dollar of tax money need be diverted from the job of producing armaments to build government power plants. There are no bottlenecks in the power industry.
