#### BOND PAYMENTS MADE BY STATE

Bond payments made by the state of Oregon on April 1st of this year cut the state's outstanding bonded indebtedness to vention at Hillsboro set for June \$33,366,385, it was disclosed today by Earl Snell, secretary of state. On April 1st, payments totaling \$1.775,000 became due.

The state's outstanding bonder indebtedness as of Dec. 31, 1940 will attend the session, accord- amounted to \$35,175,385. The April 1st payments cut this figure to the \$33,366,385 marke! and put the state in the posttion of having reduced its borried indebtedness by slightly over 40 percent since 1930 when, at the end of the year, the outstanding bonds totaled \$60,339,510.

> The bonded indebtedness at the end of 1940 was divided as follows: highway bonds, \$14,766,-750; world war veterans' state ald bonds, \$18,275,000; irrigation districts interest bonds, \$2.081. 635; rural credits farm loan bonds, \$52,000. In addition to the April 1 payments this year. the state paid off \$34,000 of irrigation districts interest bon's cil Barnes house on Second st. in January of this year.

Louis Belanglie, Area Surpresent for the Surplus Marketing Administration. These are the surplus forte which may be obtained in exchange for blue surnlus , food stamps in local stores...

The notionally designated entplus foods available in all ar eas for the April 1 to April 30 period are as follows: fresh grapefruit, oranges, apples, carrots, onions (except green onions), Irish potatoes, butter, raisins, pork lard, all perk (except that cooked or packed in motal containers), corn meal, shell eggs, dried prunes, homeiny (corn) grits, dry edible beans, wheat flour and whole wheat (graham) flour.
