VIOLATIONS OF PLAN ARE NOTED

Citations for alleged non-compliance with federal regulations governing the food stamp plan have been issued to sixteen Oregon food retailers, according to an announcement made this week by M. Louis Belangie, area supervisor of the Surplus Marketing Administration.

Charges were for selling such items as gasoline, cigarettes, beer and other non-food commodities in exchange for the food stamps.

"It is unfortunate that there are always a few who try to beat the game," said Belangie. "The vast majority of food retailers in the Northwest are doing a commendable job in selling the farmers' surplus crops through the stamp plan and it is with their cooperation that we are going to eliminate the violators from sharing in the stamp business."

Penalties for misuse of food stamps include being disbarred from further participation in the plan, jail sentence up to ten years or fines up to \$10,000.

Belangie pointed out that the public assistance person using stamps is liable to the same penalties.

POSSES TO HAVE PART IN FESTIVAL

Newly formed Sheriffs' Posses will have a part in the coming Portland Rose Festival, June 11 to 14, according to plans announced by John J. Winn, chairman of the program committee. Posses from Clackamas County, Wasco County, Marion County and Multnomah County will be presented with all their new silver saddles and modern accoutrements in the night show at the stadium, Thursday, June 12th. They will present a ten minute program in which drills rehearsed by the four organizations separately will be offered in unison, with eighty horsemen taking part.

The Wasco County unit will escort the float of The Dalles Booster girls in the grand floral parade, the Marion County unit will precede the Cherrians and their float and the Multnomah County organization will escort the entry of Multnomah County.

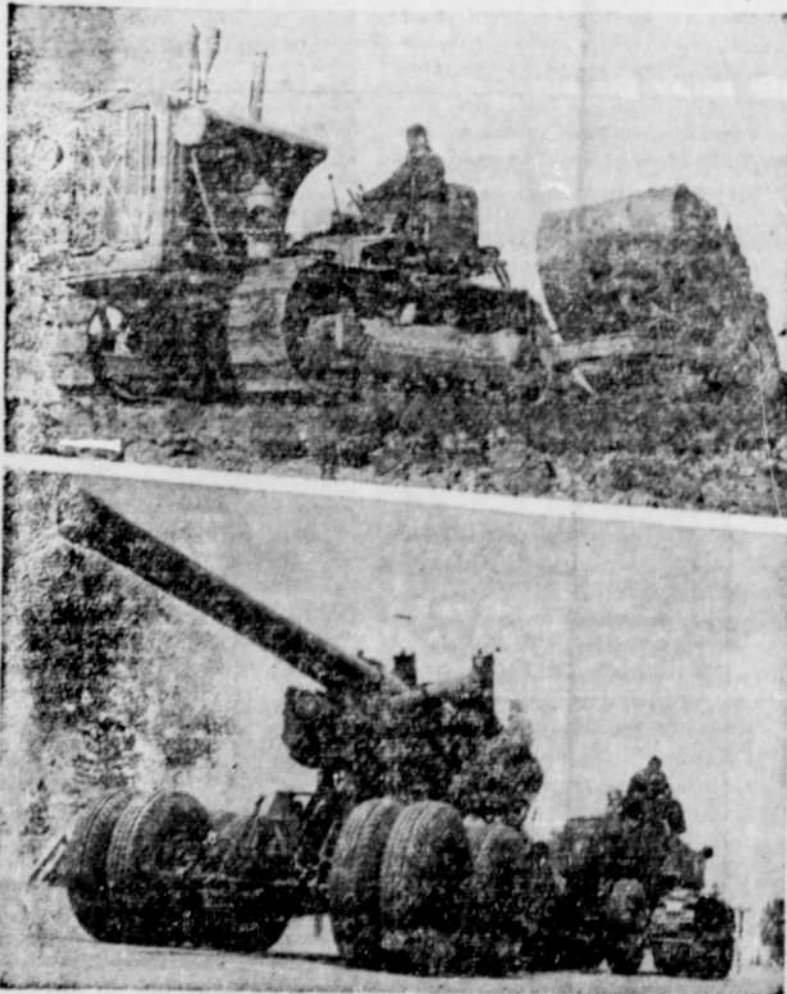
