**NEW COMPANY  
ELECTS DIRECTORS****Guarantee Loan and Trust  
Company Launch  
into Business.**

The Guarantee Loan and Trust Company, composed of a number of leading business men of Bandon and vicinity, has been organized and capitalized for \$50,000. The object of the company is to handle money, giving long time loans, and to launch into any other business that they may see an opportunity for advancement. The company has excellent financial backing and will be able to handle business on a big scale.

**Oil Prospects Same as Found  
at North Bend.**

C. S. Kaiser, who recently returned from Bandon, brought a few samples of the drillings taken from the hole being made for oil at a depth of 400 feet and has compared them with the drillings taken from a similar hole in North Bend, which was sunk at the condensary a few years ago. The drillings were kept by L. F. Falkenstein, and when compared proved identical. The drillings taken from the Bandon well were found in the most favorable indications of oil. In fact, oil in small quantities has been removed from the well, and the drillers, who have had thirty years' experience, say that oil may be struck any moment.

Mr. Kaiser says the several thicknesses of shale and lime stone passed through are the same formations that may be found in the famous Coffeerville district of Kansas, where he was quite familiar with the oil conditions.

The company at Bandon is now sinking a ten-inch casing, and will reduce this as they go on down. They have equipment sufficient to sink a well to a depth of 4,000 feet. The work is being continued and a great deal of interest is being taken in same. Coos Bay Harbor.

**Employers' Liability Law.**

Portland's commercial organizations, namely: the Chamber of Commerce, the Employers' Association, the Manufacturers' Association, and the United Metal Trades' Association, have issued the following statement and recommendation in regard to the passing of the Employers' Liability law at the coming election:

There seems to be much interest shown in the Employers' liability bills of this state which are to be on the ballot and voted for on election day.

Organized labor seems to be very anxious to have bill No. 33—passed and are using every means in their hands to carry through this measure. We believe also the employers are interested in bill No. 346, but it occurs that both parties are in much haste to adjust this great question.

New York has passed a law which went into effect Sept. 10th. This is entitled the Workmen's Compensation Law; it applies to workmen engaged in manual or mechanical labor in certain vocations whereby the workman if he meets with an accident is positive of receiving a weekly remuneration, or if he meets with death, his family receives a certain amount from the employer. New York state has also passed another law whereby it is optional with the employer or employee, which went into effect Sept. 1st.

Wisconsin has a commission with a report from same to be passed on at the next assembly of legislature.

Minnesota has a law which has been suggested by a commission and it would seem that this is a question so great that there should not be great haste in deciding it by the initiative.

Should we make a mistake and get something on the statute books which is not right, it would be next to impossible to erase same.

**OREGON APPLES  
MAKE GOOD****Will Carry off Many Prizes  
In Apple Shows  
This Year.**

Portland, Or., Oct. 25th (Special) Oregon apples will be heard from at the different apple shows of the Northwest this fall. There is close rivalry between the apple states as to which shall take the chief prizes, and on this account the Oregon growers will be put upon their mettle.

Eugene has held its apple show and many specimens of perfect fruit were exhibited. Albany will have a fine apple show on November 9th, 10th and 11th. There is keen interest in the outcome, and the many prizes will be sharply contested for. These shows will bring out the best apples in their localities and the prize fruit, together with that of other sections, will be sent to the Oregon Apple Show at Portland, November 30th, December 1st and 2nd. The best apples will, in turn, go to the National Apple Show at Spokane, the Vancouver show and the Chicago Apple Show.

Some Oregon districts will make individual displays at these fruit expositions. Hood river expects to send the two finest cars of apples ever leaving that district to the Spokane show. One car each of Spitzenbergs and Yellow Newtown apples will be entered for the sweep stakes prize, and as the showing will be gathered from the large acreage given to growing these varieties, it will be of a very high quality.

Medford will make a strong showing at the Canadian National Apple Show at Vancouver, B. C. A car of fancy Yellow Newtown Pippins will be sent from one orchard. Medford people believe this will be as fine a carload of yellow apples as has ever been placed on exhibition. Medford will also send exhibits to Spokane and Chicago.
