From \$6.50 to \$7 per cord is the price of four foot fir wood in Portland, and it is expected that prices will go still higher, unless cordwood consumers use more slabwood and coal. There is plenty of coal going into the city daily, which is selling from \$5.50 to \$12 a ton. "Practically all of the coal coming into Portland in handled through two firms—the Pacific Coast Fuel Co., and the Independent Coal & Ice Co., and as practically every retail dealer in wood in the city is a member of the dealers' association, the price of both are regulated by the other. Pennsylvania anthracite coal is selling for from \$18 to \$19 a ton. Coal is high because wood is high, and the consumer may safely bet that the prices of both will jump synchronously. Therefore, although there is little danger of a coal famine, prices in all probability will be regulated by the prices of wood, which because of the shortage, will go a-jumping."—Coos Bay News.
