PIERRE MILLIONAIRE IS INDICTED

Charles L. Hyde, of Pierre, South Dakota, Faces Federal Charge

In the United States court in this city yesterday forenoon, Charles L. Hyde of Pierre, whose wealth is variously estimated at between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000 and who is one of the few millionaires in South Dakota, was arraigned upon an indictment, returned by the United States grand jury of this term of court upon a charge of misusing the United States mails to defraud.

There are three counts to the indictment

The complaint upon which the indictment is based charges that Hyde used the mails in selling to non-residents worthless lots, located in the ravines and on the hills, surrounding the capital of South Dakota, setting them forth as valuable and desirable and advertising them by means of maps and literature, which literature and maps indicated two street car lines in the city of Pierre and many large buildings and business institutions located along those lines of street railroad, which misleading information was circulated through the mails.

Mr. Hyde is held under \$2,000 bonds.

The above article is taken from the Sioux Falls Press, of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, and is an account of the indictment of the Chas. L. Hyde, whom it will be remembered by readers of the RECORDER tried to cause trouble for J. W. Roberts, cashier of the First National Bank of Bandon, by sending out a paper with what appeared to be an editorial in which Hyde tried to defend himself, and at the same time to cast reflections on Mr. Roberts' character. Mr. Roberts took the matter up with his attorneys, Bailey & Voorhees, of Sioux Falls, but said that they could do nothing regarding the article as Hyde made no direct statement and had so worded the article that it could be shown that no intention had been shown to slander Mr. Roberts.

Mr. Hyde has practiced his game for twenty years, the details of which will be remembered by RECORDER readers who read the article published on September 29, and Mr. Roberts is the man who instigated the investigation that brought about the indictment of Hyde, the procedure of which was published in the former article referred to. The Associated Press has sent to Mr. Roberts for a full account of the swindle, but readers of the RECORDER have been given the details far in advance of the Associated Press reports.

The management of the First National Bank were lucky in getting an active officer of this caliber who will not stand for graft, and that people have confidence in the bank; it is shown by the fact that the deposits have increased materially since it became known that the bank is now on a dividend paying basis at the end of six months' business. Being a national bank and managed by a man who has had nine years banking experience, and the affairs of the institution being examined every three months by a special auditing committee of three of the directors besides the five statements of the comptroller of currency and the examination of the bank annually by the National Bank Examiner makes the institution as safe as any bank in the country.

CITY COUNCIL REGULAR SESSION

Transact Much Business of Importance Wednesday Night.

The City Council met in regular session at the city hall Wednesday night and transacted much business of importance.

Mayor Mast was in the chair and all the councilmen were present.

The improvement of Second St. was up for discussion and was laid over until next meeting so that further investigation can be made before final action is taken. Rev. Horsefall was present and addressed the council, asking to be relieved of building 490 feet of sidewalk on Spruce St., as the travel on the street was not sufficient at present to warrant the expense. The council decided to postpone the work until further investigation could be made as to the wishes of the people in that section in the matter.

The City Recorder was instructed to write the state engineer regarding the water permit for the city water system, as nothing had been heard from him for some time.

Councilman P. C. Stevenson was appointed to look after the public watering trough which was ordered some time ago.

The city engineers' profiles of Spruce and Sixth streets were accepted.

The appointment of F. J. Feeney as city attorney was announced by Mayor Mast and unanimously endorsed by the council.

Two Marshfield Divisions of the Oregon Naval Reserve were mustered in at the Chamber of Commerce office Friday evening by Commander Shepard of the Oregon Naval Reserve. The Divisions have a total of 86 men, which makes Coos Bay the foremost post in the state. It is hoped that a governmentship will be stationed here for training purposes, and an effort with that object in view will be made.—Coos Bay News.

BOX FACTORY FOR BANDON

Will Be Erected on Atwater St. Opposite Steam Laundry.

Bandon is to have a box factory at once, unless present plans of the promoters are held up. A J. Hartman, Chris Boetcher and Mr. Minehart are the promoters of the scheme and the building is to be erected on the Hartman lots opposite the steam laundry. The foundation has already been built, and material is ordered for the main building. The factory will start on a small scale, and will enlarge as business increases.

The promoters are very sanguine of success and are meeting with much encouragement.

Chicago, Nov. 2d—The attorney who secured freedom for Senator Lorimer is accused of having tampered with the jury. Men who accepted bribe are said to have become disgusted over the small amount.

Honolulu, Nov. 2d—Japanese cruisers Asama and Asahi arrived here today. They leave shortly for San Francisco.

New York, Nov. 2d—An aviator will go fifty miles out to sea on a liner next Saturday and then attempt to reach land in an aeroplane. This may mean that the big steamer, Europa, now under construction, will be fitted with aeroplane service.

Newport, R. I., Nov. 3d—Commander and crew of submarine Octopus, were nearly killed. Five men were unconscious due to fumes from storage battery.

London, Nov. 3d—Abdul Hamid, deposed Sultan of Turkey, is critically ill. He is expected to die at any moment.

San Francisco, Cal.—Preliminaries for a 20 round match between Ad Wolgast and Battling Nelson to take place December 24, were completed yesterday, according to Promoter Blott. Blott stated that the men would sign the articles today.
