Election Day

Today is election day, the battle of ballots is on. Much interest has been taken in the campaign, in all its phases, throughout the state, but the main point of contention is centered around two particular features, the office of governor and the liquor question.

The liquor question is not being fought out on political lines but is one of the 32 measures proposed by initiative petition and there will be men of all parties who will vote for the measure and while others will vote against it. It is simply the "wet" against the "dry" and the outcome will be watched with breathless interest.

A wonderful campaign has been put up by both sides. The Greater Oregon Home Rule Association has spent thousands of dollars for speakers, advertising and have done some effective work.

Over against them have been arrayed the churches, ministers and a large army of people who are opposed to the liquor traffic and they too have made a telling campaign but now it is over and in a few hours the polls will be closed and election judges will commence to count the which shall decide whether Oregon will be counted among the "wet" or the "dry" states.

As to the officers to be elected, the remainder of the ticket has been practically lost sight of in the fight for governor.

The Bourne-Chamberlain machine is working for Oswald West, the democratic nominee and behind it has been the Oregon Journal, saying all the mean things about Bowerman it could think of and extolling the virtues of West, while the masses of republicans, backed by the votes Oregonian and Telegram are working for Bowerman.

Why Fair Should be Held in San Francisco.

Some very clear and forceful reasons why San Francisco should be preferred to New Orleans as the proper place to celebrate the opening of the Panama Canal in 1915 are given by Elbert Hubbard (Fra Elbertus) in the Denver Post of Sept. 24th. Among the points made by Mr. Hubbard are the following:

"The year 1915 is the centennial of the downfall of Napoleon Bonaparte. Napoleon was a Dictator—a beneficent tyrant. And, by the way, all tyrants have ever regarded themselves as beneficent.

"The year 1915 is to mark the Rule of the People.

"It is to commemorate the completion of the greatest engineering feat ever attempted—a work of the People, by the people, and for the People.

"The building of the Chinese Wall is the only engineering feat in history that actually rivals it. The French are supposed to lead the world as civil engineers. They made their plans for a Panama Canal; they spent untold treasure and twenty years' time and then abandoned the attempt as impossible.

"The Panama Canal will be the

actual realization of the short passage to India, sought by sailors and navigators for centuries.

"To commemorate this mighty achievement is worthy of our highest, noblest, and most dignified efforts.

No Mardi Gras Carnival, with its dancing clowns, prancing nymphs and showers of confetti will suffice.

"Archimedes, who invented and holds a patent on the lever, said: 'Give me a place upon which to stand, and I'll move the world.'

"San Francisco has a lever and she has a place upon which to stand. She has moved the world to admiration for her recovery from calamity, and she will now, with the help of the world, give the world the greatest object lesson in science, economy, art and industrial betterment that it has ever seen.

"She has money, the location, the climate, the water, the sunshine, the men and women—the willing brain and the strong and helpful hands.

"San Francisco now asks Congress for official permission to invite the world to come to her House Party in 1915.

"San Francisco does not ask Uncle Sam for either an appropriation or a loan.

"All she asks for is his smile and nod of recognition.

"San Francisco has now pledged and at her command Seventeen Million Dollars to finance the Panama World's Exposition.

"This is a larger sum than any World's Fair has ever had, and the Centennial Exposition had only about one-fourth as much.

"In mineral wealth Louisiana has nothing. Her one and only great engineering feat is a sewer above grade. In live stock—horses, cattle, sheep and swine—Louisiana has nothing to offer. People coming from Europe and South America, with an idea of emigrating here, would go to New Orleans and depart with a very shadowy impression of what the United States has to offer. People who do not know Colorado do not know America.

"I want the East to be siphoned through Denver as a matter of education.

"New Orleans has her shipping trade, her wholesale interests and farm products, but beyond these industries there is little to interest the economist, and even those are as nothing to people who know New York, Chicago or Boston.

"She has fruits and flowers, but not in such quantities nor variety as California has.

"Of mineral wealth New Orleans knows nothing, while San Francisco is the financial metropolis of the biggest mining and mineral interests in the world. Gold, silver, copper, lead and the semi-precious stones are on every hand, and their actual production is an object lesson which once seen is never forgotten.

"Travelers in summer go North, not South. And all agree that the Fair must be in the summer, not the winter. Americans take their vacations in June, July, August and September. We have to accept this fact simply because we can't change it.

"Many people do not realize that there are now ten splendidly equipped transcontinental railroad lines. All of these lines now make a through rate of \$33 to excursionists to California. If San Francisco gets the Fair, as she surely will, it can be safely counted on that we will have a rate better than one cent a mile.

"San Francisco—1915!"

One Man the Whole Thing in One Oregon District.

Roseburg, Ore., Nov. 5.—Prof. H. J. Robinett, who lives with his family on a homestead in the Cavitt Creek district, 30 miles east of this city, is perhaps the only man in this county, maybe in the state and the entire country, who ever held a district school meeting all by himself. His district is No. 124. The meeting was duly advertised ahead last September. Out of the eight taxpayers in the district only one put in an appearance. This was Prof. Robinett, who proceeded immediately to the transaction of business. He elected himself chairman, then as clerk. Then he elected three directors: Mrs. H. J. Robinett, Wm. Morris and S. S. Morrison, the last named having refused to qualify. All this was done by ballot, and the proceedings were properly recorded in the minute book. An opinion from Attorney General Crawford tells Prof. Robinett that the "meeting" was a legal one in every way. The district has six children of school age, and five of these are of Robinett's family. Six of the eight taxpayers of the district are bachelors. Arrangements are under way to begin a six months' term of school, which Prof. Robinett expects to teach.

W. A. Custer, of this city, returned last Thursday from an extended trip throughout the east. While away Mr. Custer visited Texas, Indiana, Ohio and North Dakota, as well as many of the states along the Mississippi River. He stated that it has been very dry in the east this year, but notwithstanding this fact they had a mammoth corn crop in the corn belt. However, owing to an open March and an unusually severe April, the eastern states have practically no fruit this year. Mr. Custer says he is satisfied he could find two apple trees in this section with as many apples on as he saw in the entire sections he visited while in the east. And for this as well as other reasons he says he would not live back there five years for the best farm in the country. No one would who has lived in Coos county for any length of time. Mr. Custer was absent about seven months.—Coquille Sentinel.

Happy Smith, one of the Coos county boys who have made good in outside base ball, returned to this city with his bride this week. The success of the past several years has not spoiled Happy in any way, and he is just as proud of Coos county as Coos county is of him. Mrs. Happy is a former San Jose young lady whom he met while on his tour of success in the base ball world. 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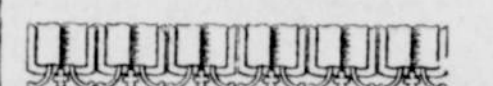
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
