Thanksgiving Day Proclamation.

By President William H. Taft.

"This year of 1910 is drawing to a close. The records of population and harvests, which are the index of progress, show vigorous national growth and the health and prosperous well being of our communities throughout this land and in our possessions beyond the sea. These blessings have not descended upon us in restricted measure, but overflow and abound. They are the blessings and bounty of God.

"We continue to be at peace with the rest of the world. In all essential matters, our relations with other peoples are harmonious, with an ever-growing reality of friendliness and depth of recognition of mutual dependence. It is especially to be noted that during the past year great progress has been achieved in the cause of arbitration and the peaceful settlement of international disputes.

"Now, therefore, I, William Howard Taft, President of the United States of America, in accordance with the wise custom of the civil magistrates since the first settlements in this land, and with the rule established from the foundation of this government, do appoint Thursday Nov. 24, 1910, as a day of national thanksgiving and prayer, enjoining the people upon that day to meet in their churches for the praise of Almighty God and to return heartfelt thanks to Him for all His goodness and loving kindness."

We Are Not Poor Nor Near-Poor.

Though we justly complain of high prices and the increased cost of living, we, the people of the United States, taken as a whole, are able to show quite a margin above living expenses. As we turn to the report of the Treasury Department, which gives us some figures on savings banks, we are reminded that the average American as well as the French peasant has acquired the habit of putting something by for a rainy day, and that the aggregate of that "something" is increasing from year to year at a somewhat marvelous rate.

That report has to do with the transactions of 1750 savings banks for the year ending June 30th last, and in the summary it shows that the total deposits in those institutions were four billion dollars, which means little to the ordinary comprehension, except that it denotes great value. It might be well to note in passing, that the value is nearly half that of the total agricultural production of the country for the same year. Other facts of interest in that summary are: the number of savings bank deposi-

tors increased during the year by approximately 300,000, and the average depositor's bank account was raised from \$420 to \$445.

This is a good showing—one that should cause the optimist to sit up and take notice. It indicates, among other things, that the average American is getting more and more into the way of conserving his resources and opportunities for the better living of himself and those who shall come after him. He himself makes it evident, through the public prints and by various modes of expression, that, as he learns to be thrifty he wants to see greater returns for his thrift. Legitimately does he establish new standards of living and upon these he demands a greater share of the things produced.

It is this which makes his complaint of pinching conditions logical and entirely proper. It would be better for the country if the savings bank deposits report could show a total of eight billion dollars instead of four, because in that deposit there is evidence of the more general distribution of wealth.—Telegram.

What Financial Leaders Say.

How the financial leaders of the United States regard New Orleans' ability to hold an international exposition is shown in the editorial attitude of the Wall Street Journal, New York, the mouthpiece of American finance, which printed the following terse statement in its issue of Oct. 27th.

"The recent failure of the city of New Orleans to sell \$7,000,000 4 per cent 18-32 year bonds is now regarded as almost assuring the Panama Exposition for California. On November 3d New Orleans will vote on floating \$6,500,000 in aid of the exposition. Strong opposition is at work, opponents of the plan claiming that the city is already taxed and bonded to the limit of endurance. Recent figures show the

present bonded debt of the city as \$52,521,040 which with the \$7,000,000 and other debts would bring the total indebtedness above \$60,000,000.
