## M. F. PLANT IN DISTRESS

### Coos Bay Steamer Has Accident Near Cape Blanco Today.

(Wireless via Cape Blanco.)

The Steamship M F Plant was disabled three miles north of Cape Blanco at 11:30 this morning. The Blanco wireless station got into communication with the Steamship Atlas, which was at sea with a barge in tow. The Atlas stood in to lend assistance, but two other steam schooners, names not known, came to the assistance of the Plant. One schooner passed on south, but the other took the Plant in tow and started north for Coos Bay. The nature of the Plant's trouble is not known, as neither the Plant or the schooners which came to her assistance was equipped with wireless, so that it was impossible for the Blanco station to get into communication with them, and at this time, 2 p. m., she has just been sighted going north, from the Bandon lookout. Further details are unobtainable.

### Lodge.

Although the next legislature of Massachusetts will be Republican, it is not certain that Senator Lodge will be reelected. There are 153 Republican members and it takes 141 to elect. The Boston Globe, which has been carefully canvassing these members says:

"Many Republicans have answered in a way that plainly hints their dissatisfaction with Mr. Lodge's candidacy, while those who have openly declared in the Globe their opposition to his reelection are sufficient in number to leave him without a Republican majority. If he is to win he must drive some of these independent members into line or get help from the democrats."

Senator Lodge is a man of great ability, and has been a considerable figure in the senate. He is, however, a standpatter and as such is out of harmony with the state of Massachusetts according to the recent election returns.—Journal.

### Mrs. Rossiter's Mother Dies.

Dr. Rossiter received word yesterday from Mrs. Rossiter who is at St. Paul, Minn., that the latter's mother, Mrs. Olive B. Simmons, had passed away at her home, 186 Prescott St., St. Paul, Nov. 18th. When Mrs. Simmons was a young woman she was very strong, but had a severe attack of typhoid fever when Mrs. Rossiter was about 14 years old, and since then has been more or less of an invalid.

This summer Mrs. Rossiter had a premonition that she should go to see her mother, consequently left about a month ago for St. Paul, and arrived in time to have a good visit, before the mother became violently ill, which was a great source of consolation.

Mrs. Simmons was 64 years old at the time of her death, and besides Mrs. Rossiter, had two other daughters, Mrs. Gardner of St. Paul, Minn., and Mrs. Lees of Minneapolis. The many Bandon friends of the Dr. Rossiter family will extend sincere sympathy in their time of grief.

## Be a Real Booster.

Present indications are that Bandon will make more improvement during the coming year than in any previous year in its history, especially if all the new industries that are now contemplated will but materialize. There is only one way, however, for this to be accomplished, and that is for everybody to get in and boost.

The constant knocking of present conditions which is being done by some people will not help in any manner to build up the city, but will put a damper on any means of improvement that is contemplated.

We cannot boost this town alone unless we boost the country adjacent to it. The best way to do this is to work for better roads leading to town. At the recent election the road bonding measure was carried by a large majority, showing that the people everywhere want better roads. This is our opportunity to be one of the first road districts to take advantage of the measure and put the roads into condition so the farmers can get their produce to market, for it is upon them that a large portion of the development of the city depends, and we have energetic farmers near Bandon, if they are only given an opportunity.

So far as the city of Bandon itself is concerned, we should encourage every industry that comes here with capital to invest, for it is capital that we need more than anything else, as capital will employ labor and labor builds a city.

Another thing that should not be forgotten is to speak a good word for your city occasionally, and even to say a word commendable of the city officials now and then would hurt no one. These men are giving a large portion of their valuable time to the city, gratis. They may make mistakes some times "to err is human, to forgive is divine," but the city officials are not asking anyone to forgive their shortcomings, for they are aware that they cannot do everything in a day. We are not making an appeal for the city officials, but we are making an appeal for harmony. The meetings of the city council are held in the city hall; they are open to all the public and if you have any suggestions to make, why not attend the meeting and make them, and they will no doubt be given due consideration.

In short let us all get together, let us be friendly, let us make kindly suggestions, let us help each other, and by so doing will build a greater Bandon and a greater Coquille valley.

## DP. CRIPPEN HANGED WEDNESDAY

### American Murderer Almost Breaks Down As He Goes to Gallows in London.

London, Nov. 23.—Dr. Hawley Harvey Crippen today paid the penalty for the murder of his wife, Belle Elmore, the actress. Within a few minutes of the stroke of nine, this morning, the hour officially fixed for his execution, the condemned presented a pitiable appearance as he was led from his cell to the scaffold and all but collapsed on the gallows. The doomed man had a resileless night and seemed to lose all his fortitude as the end approached. He did not touch his breakfast and his face was colorless as he was escorted to the gallows. The gruesome work was soon done, a drop of seven feet producing instant death.

## WOULD PUT ON BOAT TO PORTLAND

### Man Here To-day locking Into the Situation.

A gentleman was in the city today with the object in view of putting a boat on the regular run between here and Portland. The RECORDER is not at liberty to give out any names at this time as the plans are yet in embryo, but the gentleman was sent here by the Portland Chamber of Commerce, which organization is anxious to get some of the Coquille river trade and to secure some of our coal and other products, and are willing to do anything in their power to bring about the desired result.

The only thing that is asked is for Bandon people to guarantee the expenses of the boat, which ought to be an easy matter. The gentleman would not give the name of the boat, but says it is a good fast boat, larger than the Newport, and has first class accommodations for 38 passengers.

It is now up to Bandon people to get busy if we want a boat to Portland.

A special meeting of the Commercial Club was held this forenoon and the matter was taken under advisement and will be pushed to a successful culmination if possible.
