A new table has been installed in the main council room of the city hall for the benefit of the city attorney and city recorder. Tables will probably be provided for the council also in the near future.

CITY COUNCIL IN REGULAR SESSION

Transact Much Business and Allow a Number of Bills.

The city council met in regular session at the city hall Wednesday night and transacted much business of importance, in addition to the allowance of the usual bills.

After the reading and approving of the minutes, the matter of bids for the improvement of Second St., between Coquille and Columbia Avenues in Woolen Mill addition was taken up.

Four bids were handed in and Gus Barre being the lowest bidder was awarded the contract.

The city marshal was ordered to see that the 4th street sewer was put in condition, and if the property owners did not do something, then the city would do the work and collect from the property owners.

The Bandon Light & Power Co. was granted the privilege of using the old county bridge next to the power plant as a wood yard. The bridge had been closed by the city because of being unsafe, but the Light & Power Co. agreed to assume all damages if any should occur.

Wm. McKay, as Worthy Patron of the Eastern Star, was present and asked that the five dollars license paid to the city on the occasion of the play "The Girl of the Hour," be refunded, but after an extended discussion on the subject the council decided that under the charter they could not refund the money.

A petition to improve Coquille Avenue between Sixth and Iris streets was read and after discussing the matter pro and con, the council decided to advertise their intention of improving the same. This is the course subject to remonstrance by the property owners if they choose.

The arc light at Garfield's was ordered taken out and 32-candle incandescent lights were ordered in at Garfield's, at corner of Iris and Columbia Ave and near the Home Bakery.

The council decided to advertise its intention of putting sidewalk on the south side of Iris street from Columbia Ave. to the east city limits.

Profiles of Atwater and Coquille streets were accepted.

Municipal Judge, Geo. P. Topping was present and explained his report and the same was accepted.

The jury fee of \$6 was refunded Capt. Robert Johnson.

After the allowing of bills the council adjourned and went into executive session.

BANDON-BY-THE-SEA HAS GOOD GROWTH

School Census Indicates Increase of 300 for this Year.

Bandon-by-the-sea still continues to forge ahead in a good steady manner, as is indicated by the school census just completed by Clerk J. W. Mast. It was announced in Tuesday's RECORDER that the school population would approximate 670, but on summing up, Mr. Mast finds that it falls a little short of that figure, the exact number being 649, but this is a substantial increase over last year when it was 589, making an increase of 60, or about 10 per cent. for the district. Figuring on the usual basis of 5 people for every school child this would indicate a population for the school district of 3245, then again deducting 20, per cent. from this figure for pupils living in the district, but outside the corporate limits of Bandon, which is allowing a good margin for outside pupils, we would have 2596 people living within the corporate limits of the city.

The increase of 60 school population for the year indicates an increase of 10 per cent. in population for the district during the year. A 10 per cent. increase every year would make 100 per cent. for a decade, which is certainly growing some, and is probably the best showing of any city or district in Coos county. Bandon-by-the-sea is having a steady, substantial growth. We are having no boom and don't want any.

If all the industries and new business projects come to Bandon in the next year, that are now promised, and there is every reason to believe they will, then Bandon should grow more rapidly in 1911 than in any previous year of her history, but the growth will be a substantial one.

NEW INDUSTRIES FOR BANDON

Splint Factory and Box Factory Both to Start Soon

That Bandon is assured of a good growth during the coming year is becoming more evident all the time from the new industries that are constantly springing up.

Readers of the RECORDER will remember the announcement by this paper some time ago of the visit of C. D. Edwards, representative of the Portland Basket and Handle Co., to this place looking for a location to start a splint factory, and we are pleased to announce at this time that Mr. Edwards has returned and is preparing to commence operations at once. The name of the firm will be The Bandon Splint Co., and the place of operation will be in Fred Mehl's planing mill. Mr. Edwards will remain and personally conduct the business for a while at least. It is the intention now to start on a small scale until such time as the transportation question between Portland and Bandon takes definite form, and if a direct boat is secured between the two ports, the Splint Company will no doubt enlarge their business.

The box factory being put up by A. J. Hartman, Chris Boetcher and Mr. Minehart, is also well under way and will be pushed to completion as fast as possible.

This will add two substantial industries to Bandon-by-the-sea, and thus more fully assures a great future for our city. Let them all come.

Along the Wharf

The Newport sailed yesterday with a full cargo of lumber.

The Arcata arrived in from San Francisco and is loading coal at the Gage pier at Riverton. She is a three masted steam schooner, and is said to be the oldest boat plying on the coast, having gone up and down the coast for 35 years and has made the trip hundreds and perhaps thousands of times, but this is the first time she has stopped in at this port. She was formerly a passenger boat and many of our early settlers say they came to this section of the country on her from 20 to 30 years ago.
