### Portland Live Stock Market

Portland, Ore., Jan. 7, 1911.—(Special) Receipts on this market for the first week in January, 1911, are as follows: cattle 1952, calves 78, hogs 1822, and sheep 4127, which, considering the season, is a good beginning for the New Year.

Two lots of extra choice California steers brought respectively 7.50 and 6.90, but the general tone of the cattle market was quieter, and buyers showed a tendency to discriminate more closely between the different grades offered. Good steers are quoted as steady to strong at 6.50 to 6.75; the cow market is about the same as quoted heretofore. The sale of three registered Shorthorn heifers at 6.25 demonstrated once more the value of good breeding. The bull market was exceptionally strong, 4.75 being the highest price paid for sometime.

The hog market showed an increase of 20c a hundred, opening on Monday with a top of 8.90, and reaching 9.10 before the close of the week. Although Eastern markets hardly justify this price, the scarcity of local hogs prevents buyers and packers from forcing the price down.

The sheep market has been very good during the past week. The sale of grain fed lambs at 6.50, ewes at 4.75 and mixed sheep at 4.25, being an advance of 50c over hay fed stuff, shows that the buyers appreciate good mutton.
