Lodge Re-elected

Boston, Mass., Jan. 18.—Henry Cabot Lodge was today re-elected to the United States senate, winning despite the hardest fight of his political career, in which the personal animosity of Governor Eugene N. Foss and the ambitious efforts of Congressman Butler Ames were the backbone of a most bitter opposition.

The joint ballot gave Lodge 146 votes; Sherman H. Whipple, Democrat, 121; Congressman Butler Ames, 7; scattering, 5; 141 votes were necessary to elect.

Portland Men Delay Visit

Word was received here last Saturday to the effect that the Portland business men who had proposed a trip to Coos county had postponed such visit, for the present at least. The Anvil and delegation were expected here yesterday or today, as the boat was to have sailed from Astoria last Monday; however she did not sail until Thursday, hence the arrival will be delayed.
