Washington, D. C., Jan. 23.—Senator Jonathan Bourne is ill with la grippe and on advice of his physician is obliged to remain in his room. Pending his recovery the Senate Commerce Committee is withholding action on his amendment appropriating funds for a 30-foot channel in the Columbia river. There is opposition to this amendment in the Commerce Committee, some of the members of which assert that Oregon now has items in the bill aggregating 10 per cent of its total appropriations.
