G. F. Averill, who tried promoting an electric line from Coos Bay to Roseburg last year, is now soliciting the sale of stock in the Coos Bay and Willamette Traction Co. It is the plan of this company to establish a four-hour service between Coos Bay, Oakland and Roseburg. The business will be connected by boat from Marshfield to the head of navigation on Coos river and from there across the country for 104 miles by auto car service. It is considered necessary to construct about 20 miles of auto car track from the McKnight landing to Milwood over a two per cent grade. The equipment is to be of six 20 passenger Pullman Rapid Motor vehicles and six combination passenger and baggage cars of like capacity, also two passenger boats for the river and bay run. The capital stock is to be a million dollars.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

Rackleff Introduces Bills.

Representative Rackleff of Coos county has introduced a bill designed to enable the maintenance of good roads, by prohibiting one of the chief evils of any road to be used. It is said that road makers from all parts of the state will encourage their respective representatives to support the measure.

CARE OF TOILET SOAP.

How to Avoid Trouble and Loss by Careful Use.

Even when a toilet soap is pure beyond reproach it does not suit all skins. Get soap from a reliable dealer and consult him on which he thinks the purest one. If he is a competent druggist and not given too much to profit making you will get the truth.

If you have a chemist friend he can be asked about the purity of a favored soap; also its effect on dry and oily skins. A glycerin soap, for instance, will chap one skin, will yellow another and make a third soft and smooth. Secure half a dozen different soaps of equal purity, then experiment to find which agrees best with you.

There is much carelessness in the use of soap. The presence of soap powders in many public wash rooms has eliminated much of the danger of a common soap cake for travelers. Individual soap wrapped in a sealed case is a boon in hotels where a patron has forgotten her own.

The woman who would scorn to use soap in a public wash room thinks nothing of using a family cake. This is not sanitary. Besides the fact of different soaps being needed by different skins, various members of the family may have undeveloped skin troubles that are contagious.

If possible each child should have her own cake of soap as much as her toothbrush, comb and towel. If washing arrangements are too cramped to permit this the child should be taught to hold each cake by the tip under scalding water for a minute before using. It may mean the loss of an extra layer of soap, but it may save trouble.

A soap manufacturer says that fine toilet soaps need drying and ripening as much as coarser soaps. It is therefore economical to buy a number of cakes at once and let them dry by placing on a shelf. This should be in some room or closet where there is not much dust or soot.

Fine soap will last longer if it is drained off a minute before being put back in the soap dish, which should first be carefully wiped out until no moisture is left. A perforated dish or top should be selected.

Children should be taught not to let soap lie in water. Besides being wasteful, it is bad for the skin to use too much even of a good soap, and if not carefully rinsed it makes the skin shiny and clogged.

CARE OF WHITE HAIR.

How to Treat It and Preserve Its Color by Simple Methods.

No kind of hair is prettier than the white, but it is something of a task to keep white hair really white.

Dusty brushes soon make white hair look rather muddy. The woman whose hair is white needs to wash combs and brushes every three or four days. White hair is more brittle than other kinds, so it must be handled gently—no tugging and no washes that are too strong; also when being dried care must be taken not to use too much heat.

Though some white haired women use ordinary shampoo mixtures with impunity, they do so at their peril, for these shampoos are apt to make white hair ludicrously streaky. The finest bath for it is made by mixing the whites of two eggs lightly with a tablespoonful of warm water. This egg shampoo may be rubbed into the scalp, and the hair should be carefully parted so that the scalp may be reached. The long hair may be thoroughly washed with it also. Then the scalp and hair must be rinsed thoroughly with lukewarm water. After this rinse it in cold water. The best water for white hair is that from the spring or that which has been filtered.

The white haired woman should beware of tonics for the hair as a scalp. Women with dark locks may safely use these, but not she of the snowy tresses. With great care in the application crude oil may be used once in awhile, or the scalp may be rubbed gently with a little white vasoline. Any grease, however, must be kept off the long hair; otherwise dust will be very quickly collected, and this will make the hair lose its luster.

Shampoo with white hair with lemon is excellent treatment. Put half the cut lemon in a thin muslin cloth and rub it over the scalp, first thoroughly wetting the scalp. A few drops of bluing in the rinsing water will give the much admired silvery glint to white hair.

How to Clean Alabaster Ornaments. Alabaster ornaments can be beautifully cleaned by immersing them for some time in milk of lime, washing afterward in clean water, then dusting when dry with a little French chalk. The milk of lime is made by mixing enough slaked lime in water to give it a milk appearance. A second and very simple way is to use soap and water with a little washing soda or ammonia and rinse thoroughly afterward.

How to Bleach Colored Clothes. The colored frock or blouse that has become faded with frequent launderings or from wear in the sun may be bleached to a clear white by boiling in a cream of tartar. The correct quantity to be used to make the garment a pure white is a teaspoonful of the powder to a quart of water.

How to Clean Tan Shoes. Tan shoes will not turn dark, but will retain their color and may be kept clean, by washing with cold water and rubbing with a clean cloth. No polish should be used.

A Breakfast Guest.

I now will pick up little incidents which happened here or there in my many and large travels in different countries.

After leaving Wyoming en route to meet my brother Richard who then was mining engineer in Hamilton, Utah, I left the railroad at Elko.

There was yet 160 miles to be traveled by stage and it would have cost me twenty dollars; to avoid this expense I shouldered my blankets, gun and crop stake, and started on foot. It was mostly uphill work with the exception of many long and dry deserts; the trip in itself was interesting and in a five days' march I could have completed it.

The second night I had made my camp at the edge of one of the small flats between two ridges, and a few scrubby pine trees gave shelter from the heavy night dews; I rested well.

As morning appeared I kindled a fire, placed a peach can, as a substitute for a coffee pot, in the hot ashes next to the fire, and waited for the boiling of the water to make a cup of mocha.

Attracted by the heat of the fire a tarantula moved up towards me; it was the first of its kind I had met alive; however, the information I received from other travelers I accepted their instructions: they were aggressive, their bites very dangerous and painful, and more often deadly.

When within five feet of me it arose upon its strong hind legs; stepping to one side I had the fire between me and the ugly looking thing, thus gaining a good opportunity to watch its actions.

The body seemed to be about as large as a walnut; it and the legs were covered with brown black hair about a quarter of an inch long; an imaginary circle around the feet would have covered the size of the palm of a man's hand.

It moved quickly making starts to raise and then jump towards me.

What plans it had I don't know exactly, but I could see that my neighborhood was irritating to it and my keeping the fire between it and myself seemed to increase its temper. The fire, too, when coming too near it, made it hastily retreat; then it rose up and stood without a motion, at such times a little drop of clear liquid was at its mouth and the little black eyes sparkled like small black diamonds in different colors.

In one of those positions my coffee water began to boil; slowly, very slowly, I picked up the can and poured the contents over it.

This finished the tarantula; however it put off my breakfast and the early start I had contemplated.
