## Pact Wipes Out Family.

Oxford, Me., Feb. 12.—In fulfillment of a compact made with her husband during his lingering illness, which death ended yesterday, Mrs. Lynwood S. Keene took her own life today after having fatally shot her 14 year old son, Gerald.

The compact was found in a sealed envelope in the woman's room.

Keene was once a prosperous farmer, but, according to the compact, the family had become impoverished and discouraged during his long sickness. He was 37 years old and his wife a year or two younger.

The Standard Oil Company, owners of the tank steamer Ascension, has filed a claim for \$10,000 salvage with the underwriters for rescuing and towing to port the steam schooner Shina Yak when that vessel became disabled on the Columbia River bar over a month ago. The vessel was about to founder when picked up by the Ascension and towed into the river. It is stated that the standard Oil Company will be willing to compromise on the sum of \$5,000. The officers and crew of the tank steamer will not participate in any prize money, they having signed an agreement to that effect.

A short time ago the steamer Coos Bay was reported a total wreck on the beach near Ventura, Cal. San Francisco papers state that last week she arrived there in tow of the steamer Chelalis. She was immediately placed on the dry dock where a survey will be made of her hull by representatives of the underwriters. The vessel is not badly damaged according to reports made by the diver who made an investigation of her hull after the tug Redondo pulled her into deep water.

## Notice of Street Improvement

Notice is hereby given, that on February 1st, 1911, the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, at a regular meeting thereof, by resolution ordered that Spruce Street be improved from the south line of Spruce Street in Azalea Park, then running north to the north line of Spruce street in said Azalea Park, then commencing at said north line of Spruce Street in Azalea Park, and running north through South Bandon Addition, a distance of 479 feet, to-wit: From the south line of Spruce Street in Azalea Park running north through Azalea Park and South Bandon Addition to the North line of the Hartfall property. Said improvement to consist of grading the street, and to build sidewalks on both sides of street between points therein designated to be improved; said sidewalks to be SIX feet wide and built according to provisions set forth in City Ordinance containing specifications for board sidewalks. Now unless a written remonstrance be made and signed by TWO-THIRDS of the real property owners of property fronting upon both sides of street to be improved, and such remonstrance be filed with the City Recorder on or before March 2d, 1911, then the Common Council will declare such improvement by ordinance and the cost thereof be assessed to the adjacent property abutting upon said street so described.

## Notice of Street Improvement

Notice is hereby given, that on February 1st, 1911 the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, at a regular meeting thereof, by resolution ordered that Sixth Street be improved from the West line of Broadway thence running West, including therein Randolph Avenue, to the East line of West Bandon. Said improvements to consist of grading the street and building sidewalks on both sides of street, said sidewalks to be Six (6) feet wide, that a CONCRETE flume be built on Gross Creek, where creek crosses Sixth Street, the retaining walls to be of wood, and that a fill be made over CULVERT or flume, also that a wooden flume be built in the Three (3) small creeks in the Woolen Mill and Woodland Additions which creeks also cross Sixth Street.

Now unless a written remonstrance against this improvement above designated, signed by TWO-THIRDS of the real property owners adjacent to and abutting upon Sixth Street and Randolph Avenue, and the same be filed with the City Recorder on or before the 2d day of March, 1911; then such improvement unopposed at the earliest convenience thereafter, and within six months, the said Council will pass an ordinance directing that such improvement be made as above described, and the cost thereof be assessed to the adjacent property abutting upon Sixth Street and Randolph Avenue between points herein designated to be improved.
