PHOENIX ARRIVES ON FIRST TRIP

Another First Class Passenger Boat Added to the Bandon Fleet

The Phoenix, a finely equipped passenger and freight steam schooner arrived in port this morning at 6:30 and went up to the Prosper mill to load lumber. The Phoenix is about the size of the Elizabeth and has first class passenger accommodations for 22 passengers and will carry about 350,000 feet of lumber. She has new cabin, new engines and other machinery. The Phoenix belongs to the Kruse Co., and will be run here by them, it becoming apparent that the Elizabeth could not handle all the business of the company between this port and Frisco, so both boats will be on the run hereafter. This makes three first class passenger boats between here and San Francisco, which will give us very fine service.

The steamer "Dora" brought down a big excursion crowd from Myrtle Point and they staid over until Saturday at 1 p. m. All reported an exceptionally good time on the beach and when they left the tug and Str Arcata cheered them off amid the cheers of the two schools.

Bandon is thus far tied with Myrtle Point for the Basket Ball championship, and each have four more games to play. Our next game will be with Coquille, in the Bandon Opera House, next Friday night.

Tribune Goes After Banner.

The Port Orford Tribune goes after the Lakeport Banner rough shod as follows:

"We feel called upon to pass a few remarks about the conciliatory policy advocated by the Floras Lake Banner, and of the peculiar manner it has of living up to the doctrine it advocates.

"It claims to be working for the best interest of the county, and asks the other papers to lend a hand and not knock by opposing its policy. TWIN SCREW SHIP ANVIL

L. Veysey, Manager of Boat Will Arrive on this Trip

The RECORDER is in receipt of the following letter from L. Veysey, manager of the twin screw gasoline schooner Anvil. He says:

"There is a desire for closer business relations between the towns on the Oregon coast and Portland. Game Laws Are Changed.

L. A. Liljeqvist returned yesterday from a two week's trip to Willamette valley points, the principal time being spent before the Supreme Court at Salem and with the lawmakers at the State House. Speaking of the doings of the legislators, Mr. Liljeqvist stated to a Sentinel representative that nothing of moment to the residents of Coos county has been enacted with the possible exception of changes in the game laws. The passage of this act places this county in a very peculiar predicament. The law is so worded that north of the north line of township 27 the duck season is open from September 15 to February 1, while south of that line the law remains as it formerly was regarding the open season for water fowl.

The change in the law will also allow the hunting of ducks on Coos Bay with row boats and skiffs but prohibits the shooting of any water fowl from a power boat on these waters. No change was made in the laws governing the hunting of water fowl south of the above mentioned line which lies just 6 miles north of the north end of the Moulton street bridge. North of the line the season closes February 1, while south of the line it is lawful to shoot water fowl until March 8—Coquille Sentinel.
