Department of Agriculture Starts an Experimental Wood Pulp Mill

Officials of the U. S. Department of Agriculture have received with satisfaction announcement from the experimental ground wood pulp mill which the Department has been equipping at Wausau, Wisconsin, in cooperation with the American Pulp and Paper Association, that the mill has begun to grind. The carrying on of the tests now announced as under way was provided for by a special appropriation, placed at the disposal of the Secretary of Agriculture by Congress last winter, to conduct tests of the suitability for paper making of plants and woods which seem likely to become valuable sources of supply of new material.

Secretary Wilson considered that the best use which could be made of this money would be to conduct experiments on a commercial scale, with various kinds of wood. Some of these have already been studied in the laboratory, and found to be intrinsically suitable for pulp manufacture. Indeed, the Forest Service has actually made paper by one of the chemical processes from several of them. But in order to know whether they can profitably be utilized, under present conditions, it is necessary to test them under methods of manufacture comparable to those employed in actual business operations. In particular, it is desired to find out to what extent new woods can be used for ground pulp, the cost of which is usually less than that of chemical pulp.

The Wausau mill has been built especially for the use of the Government for as long as the experiments may require. Its inside dimensions are 40 by 100 feet, and it is equipped with electrical machinery and all necessary apparatus of the most up-to-date type. Part of the equipment is contributed by the American Pulp and Paper Association, and part is furnished by the Government. The Association will also furnish the wood for the tests. The wood now on hand includes carload lots of jack pine, spruce, hemlock and tamarack. The jack pine is to be the first wood tested.

While the experiments are intended to cover woods from all parts of the country which, from the standpoint of physical properties and available supplies, promise to furnish new material for the paper making industry, a special point will be made of tests of Western woods which are abundant in the National Forests. There are enormous supplies of various softwoods in these Forests for which there now exists little demand, and this fact constitutes one of the serious problems of management of the National Forests. In order to have forests produce timber steadily they must be cut; but if there is a market only for timber from the most valuable kinds of trees the result of cutting is likely to be the disappearance of these trees and their replacement in the forest growth by species which are not in demand. Since the pulp mills take material too small for the lumber mills, species suitable for paper mak-

ing can be cut to a low timber diameter, and thus the balance may be turned in favor of the reproduction of the more valuable kinds of trees.

In addition to the benefit which the public will derive from the advancement of forest conservation in consequence of the wood pulp experiments of the Governments, there is the further benefit of cheaper paper which it is believed these experiments should make possible. The price of paper of the cheaper grades, including news paper, has been advancing rapidly of recent years as the supply of spruce has dwindled, and American mills are now drawing a large part of their supply from Canada. If ground pulp of the requisite quality can be made from new and abundant woods as cheaply as it is made from spruce, one of the most serious problems of the newspaper publisher nowadays will or should be considerably simplified.

Bandon needs a pulp mill; we have lots of spruce near here and if alder will make good pulp, which is claimed to be the case, then we have unlimited opportunities for a pulp mill. Why not try to interest the Government in our proposition?

Oregon's Development.

Twenty-two towns will be placed on the railroad map of Oregon by the operation of the Oregon Trunk up the Deschutes Canyon and on to Madras, which will be started March 1st. These centers have never before had railroad transportation and the surrounding country will increase in productivity and wealth to a remarkably extent because of the markets placed within reach of the farmers by the coming of the railroads. Pioneer conditions will obtain no longer in Central Oregon. There is now no obstacle to its agricultural development.

Products of the Beaver State will have their inning during the two weeks beginning February 27th, when the "Made in Oregon" exposition will open in Portland. Home manufacturers will show what they are doing to meet the demands of their own people for factory products, and the wide variety of articles to be shown will, unquestionably prove a surprise to many. A local department store will house the exhibits. A similar exposition was held here some years ago and was a great success. The promoters of the coming show expect to outdo the former one.

A colony of Danish farmers is to be brought to Oregon during the coming spring and established on lands in Multnomah and Yamhill counties. The immigrants will number about 100 and are all experienced in intensive farming. Small tracts will be used and vegetables, small fruits and poultry will be raised. Practically every foot of ground will be utilized by these

thirty farmers from abroad, and it is said that they can teach the American agriculturist a few things in conserving all the resources of the soil.

The use of a portion of the Penikese-Yoakum cutoff on the main line of the O. R. & N. was an event of the past week. This is the rebuilding of the track between the two points, eliminating curves and leveling grades. The work has cost \$1,250,000 and will be a great improvement for the fast and safe operation of trains.

Notice of Street Improvement

Notice is hereby given, that on February 1st, 1911 the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, at a regular meeting thereof, by resolution ordered that Sixth Street be improved from the West line of Broadway thence running West, including therein Randolph Avenue, to the East line of West Bandon. Said improvements to consist of grading the street and building sidewalks on both sides of street, said sidewalks to be Six (6) feet wide, that a CONCRETE flume be built on Gross Creek, where creek crosses Sixth Street, the retaining walls to be of wood, and that a fill be made over CULVERT or flume, also that a wooden flume be built in the Three (3) small creeks in the Woolen Mill and Woodland Additions which creek also cross Sixth Street.

Now unless a written remonstrance against this improvement above designated, signed by TWO-THIRDS of the real property owners adjacent to and abutting upon Sixth Street and Randolph Avenue, and the same be filed with the City Recorder on or before the 2d day of March, 1911; then such improvement unopposed at the earliest convenience thereafter, and within six months, the said Council will pass an ordinance directing that such improvement be made as above described, and the cost thereof be assessed to the adjacent property abutting upon Sixth Street and Randolph Avenue between points herein designated to be improved.

Notice of Street Improvement

Notice is hereby given, that on February 1st, 1911, the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, at a regular meeting thereof, by resolution ordered that Spruce Street be improved from the south line of Spruce Street in Azalea Park, then running north to the north line of Spruce street in said Azalea Park, then commencing at said north line of Spruce Street in Azalea Park, and running north through South Bandon Addition, a distance of 479 feet, to-wit: From the south line of Spruce Street in Azalea Park running north through Azalea Park and South Bandon Addition to the North line of the Hordall property. Said improvement to consist of grading the street, and to build sidewalks on both sides of street between points therein designated to be improved; said sidewalks to be SIX feet wide and built according to provisions set forth in City Ordinance containing specifications for board sidewalks. Now unless a written remonstrance be made and signed by TWO-THIRDS of the real property owners of property fronting upon both sides of street so proposed to be improved, and such remonstrance be filed with the City Recorder on or before March 2d, 1911, then the Common Council will declare such improvement by ordinance and the cost thereof be assessed to the adjacent property abutting upon said street so described.
