WANT STREET FAIR THIS FALL

Bandon Grange Takes Steps To That Effect Saturday

Bandon Grange, No. 398, at their regular meeting, Saturday, appointed a committee composed of F. F. Eddy, J. P. DeGesen and M. G. Pohl, to meet with the Bandon Commercial Club and the City Council in the near future, for the purpose of making preparations for a street fair to be held in Bandon this fall.

The idea is not to have a farmer's exhibit exclusively, but a general fair in which everybody is asked to make exhibits of products in their line, and the fair is for the benefit of Bandon and adjacent territory. The school pupils will also be asked to exhibit some of their work; this in itself will no doubt be an excellent feature of the fair. The various mills and factories of Bandon and vicinity will also be asked to make exhibits.

This is a project that everyone should be greatly interested in, and now is the time to begin preparations for the big event.

The Grange also appointed M. G. Pohl to address the high school students in the near future providing it is agreeable to the school.

Stage is Wrecked.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "The outgoing stage was overturned last Friday night soon after 8 o'clock near the residence of Jake Strong. The span of mules attached to the rig became frightened at the cavorting of a pair of calves belonging to L. A. Roberts that had escaped from their pastures, and when the stage light was thrown on them they acted up something scandalous according to the mule idea of calf etiquette, and the mules turned about as swift as a streak of greased lightning, overturning the wagon and pitching the passengers, driver and contents out on the sidewalk. One of the passengers was somewhat cut and bruised but none of them attached blame to the driver. One of the horses was thrown down in the mixup and dragged about 100 feet, and the mules ran a block or two and then came to a stop on a vacant lot. No damage was done to equipment except the breaking of the reach of the stage."

Refuses Work on City Street.

Chas Bostrom to-day overruled City Recorder Butler's decision that in the future men fined who were unable to pay cash would have to work it out on the streets instead of "laying it" out in jail. Bostrom refused to work on the street and was given the privilege of either doing that or serving his time on bread and water. MANY BOATS MAKE THIS PORT

Commerce Increases Rapidly Both in and Out of Coquille River.

To those who may not know of the importance of the Coquille river as a shipping port, it may be of interest to learn that there is a constant increase in the commerce both in and out of this port. Since January 1st there have been 87 arrivals and departures of boats, at this harbor. In January there were even 40, in February 34 and to date in March thirteen vessels have crossed the bar. This is the 65th day of the year and with 87 arrivals and departures of ocean going boats, it makes an average of nearly 1 1/2 boats a day, which is certainly a good record, and shows that the port is gaining in importance all the time. We were unable to get the total tonnage in and out of the port on the various boats, but it runs up into the many thousands of tons, thus showing the vast wealth of this great country.

Say They Got Short End.

The Coquille Sentinel says the Commercial Club of that city refused to put out a joint pamphlet with Bandon advertising the Coquille valley, because on several occasions when joint pamphlets had been issued, Coquille had been given the short end. Now this is considerable of a slam on Bandon, and we think it can be definitely shown that at no time has Bandon ever given Coquille the short end when the two towns have been involved. We are frank to admit that the valley has suffered at the hands of Coos Bay, particularly so in the pamphlet gotten out for the Seattle fair, but for Coquille to intimate Bandon was in anywise responsible for this, would be presuming a great deal.

Neither the Bandon Commercial Club nor the Bandon Recorder wants to get into a squabble with the Coquille Commercial Club or the Coquille Sentinel, but in the light of such action on the part of Coquille, we certainly feel that some explanation is due. Not that Bandon cannot get out her own pamphlet if she wants one, but the insinuation that Bandon has been unfair is what sticks in our craw.

New Road Open.

Heretofore residents of the South Slough country wishing to go to Coquille were compelled to come around by way of Newport or Marshfield. Z. T. Siglin, who was in town Thursday, informs us that this is no longer necessary, as the Davis Slough road is now completed. This road intersects the Marshfield Coquille road at the mouth of Davis Slough on the Isthmus, and is open to the county bridge on South Slough, thus saving ten or twelve miles in the distance traveled in going from the South Slough country to the county seat. The opening of the road is also quite an accommodation to residents of the coast below the Cape.—Coos Bay News.
