## New National Forest Range

The Secretary of Agriculture has approved a revised form of the grazing regulations which govern use of the National Forest range. In the opinion of the Department officers, the most important departures from the old regulations are found, first in the fact that provision is made for recognition of a prominent National advisory board, representing the sheep and cattle interests, which will confer annually with the Secretary of Agriculture concerning grazing matters; and secondly in the laying down of a rule that on Forests where the quality of range and advantages for raising cattle and sheep are equal, the yearling rate for sheep after the season of 1911 will be thirty per cent of the year-long rate for cattle.

The new regulations have been made the subject of extended and most careful consideration and are promulgated at the present time as the result of a general revision made of all the regulations governing the use of the National Forests. Before deciding on the grazing regulation, Secretary Wilson invited representatives of the two great National organizations of stockmen, the National Wool Growers' Association and the American National Live Stock Association, to present their views to him on grazing matters, and to make any suggestions which they might wish to offer concerning the proposed regulations.

The proposed regulations as they had been drafted by the Forest Service, were submitted to delegates of the two associations who came to Washington in response to Secretary Wilson's invitation. This action on the part of Secretary Wilson is declared to be in accordance with the established policy of the Forest Service in seeking co-operation with organized bodies of stockmen who make use of the National Forest range. Secretary Wilson recognizes that the one and one half million cattle and seven and one half million sheep which are annually grazed on the Forests, bear an important relation to the price of beef and mutton in this country, and that the public need of increased food supplies no less than the best interests of the stock industry call for careful methods of regulation to promote the full use of the grazing resources. In his view, co-operation with the advisory boards of local stock associations has contributed materially to the adjudgment of range problems in a way satisfactory both to live stock men and to his department.

Regulated grazing on the National Forests seeks not only to make available, to the fullest degree, consistent with proper protection of the range itself and of forest growth and streamflow conditions, the annual forage crop, but also, to allot the grazing privilege equitably. By giving the stockmen a chance to be heard with regard to the rules established, and by securing their help in the adjustment of disputes between claimants for use of the range, the Department officials consider that the task of administering the

range satisfactorily has been made much easier.

While no radical changes in the regulations have been made, Secretary Wilson has carefully considered all modifications proposed with a view to improving the system of grazing administration. As a result of his conferences with the representatives of the stockmen's associations a number of changes were made in the details concerning the conditions under which owners may surrender, transfer, or renew application for grazing privileges. Both the Department and the stockmen are anxious to prevent speculation in grazing privileges, and suggestions for minor modifications of the rules, offered by the stockmen to this end, were readily accepted.

It is the expressed belief of Secretary Wilson that the new regulations mark a step forward in the administration of the National Forests by the Government, with the hearty co-operation of the stockmen, under effective methods which have in view both the largest possible measure of service to the public from the Forests and the fullest promotion of the welfare of the stock industry itself, consistent with this service.

## A Catalogue House's Growth

It is not pleasant news to the retail merchants of the county to read that Sears, Roebuck & Co.'s business is steadily and rapidly on the increase, says the Weekly Implementation Trade Journal, but its report for the year just ended shows an increase in sales over those of 1909 of \$10,818,256. The dividends equaled 20.47 per cent, on the common stock, as compared with 18.54 per cent earned the previous year. The total net earnings after deducting the seven per cent on the preferred stock were \$6,759,876. The sum of \$90,000 has been appropriated, it is said for the enlargement of the Bradley plant.

These facts have one item of comfort in them, however, which the dealer who is pestered with catalogue house customers might well make use of if compelled to argue the question with them, viz., that such enormous profits certainly show that they are charging their customers a profit on their purchases which they fondly imagine are given them practically at cost. The average catalogue customer apparently acts upon the supposition that the catalogue houses are really the philanthropists their advertisements proclaim them to be, and do not seem to stop to consider that it is big dividends and not philanthropy which prompts them to seek the trade of the farmers. The average farmer is a pretty smooth individual but the catalogue house customer, while he thinks he is the smoothest of the bunch, is really getting the wool pulled over his eyes practically every time he sends his money away but it is evident that the Wall street barons who own the stock and control the management have no notion of considering the mail order business in the light of philanthropy!

## About The Oregon Legislature

The Oregon legislature of 1911 is discussed pro and con by some of the members in a book entitled "Behind the Scenes at Salem" and published by Carl Smith and H. P. Edwards, legislative correspondents of the Portland Journal. Judge A. J. Derby, of Hood River, one of the two Democratic members of the House, deplors the politics and friction between the Insurgents and Regulars and concludes with the expression of the belief that the people could more wisely make all of their own laws and that the legislature is unnecessary.

Timothy Brownhill, the Yamhill county Independent, is more severe in his criticism of the session than Judge Derby. He also dwells on the political aspect, regretting the waste of time and betrayal of the people's faith involved. He also suggests that the sessions would be greatly improved by having the people elect the speaker of the House and president of the Senate, thus avoiding the "trades" on committee places.

Allen H. Eaton of Lane county, defeated candidate for speaker, defends the session and criticizes Governor West for the veto power. Eaton names some of the constructive bills which were passed and also asserts that the appropriations were not extravagant, but in accordance with the growing needs of the state.

Ben Selling, president of the Senate, various newspaper correspondents and Col. Hofer are also contributors to the book, the latter asserting that there may be one more session of the Oregon legislature and that the people will then wipe it out of existence through the initiative.

The authors undertake to tell some of the "behind the scenes occurrences," forming interesting and instructive reading for the voter. All of the important bills are taken up in detail and the reader is made intimately acquainted with the reasons of politics involved in their passage or defeat. Conclusions are presented on each member of the Senate and House, the authors declaring they have no friends to favor, or foes to punish and that the opinions are based upon facts as shown in various roll calls on the bills presented. ## Live Stock Show Big Success

Portland, Ore., March 28. (Special)—Portland gained considerable prestige as a livestock market from the recent Fat Stock Show held here. Not only was the show a great success but it broke former price records for stock. The sale of the champion steer for \$409 or 26cts. a pound, on foot, is the highest figure paid for beef on this market. The steer was two years old and was raised in Baker County.

Livestock men, the Commercial Club and the railroads contributed to the prizes and they brought out a large number of splendid exhibits. Breeders in attendance were impressed as never before with the importance of this market and its future as a live stock center. This is also the highest market for cattle in the United States, quality and condition being considered. Inside of five years, predicted a Montana stockman at the show, all the cattle in the Northwest will come to Portland.
