Socialist Elected Mayor.

Berkeley, Cal., April 1.—For the first time in the history of California a Socialist was elected Mayor of a city in this state, when J. Stitt Wilson, one of the most prominent Socialists on the Pacific Coast, to day defeated Beverly Hodghead, the Republican incumbent, by a plurality of 284 for Mayor of Berkeley.

Wilson received 2750 votes and Hodghead 2466. Wilson was the Socialist candidate for Governor last November. He was formerly a minister of the gospel.

State Forester.

It is quite probable that the appointment of a State Forester by the Oregon Forestry Commission will be made at an early date and thus enable the newly appointed officer to formulate plans early in the season to cope with the forest fires which in the past have been quite destructive in this state. Among those prominently mentioned to act in the capacity of State Forester is S. C. Bartrum, government forestry supervisor, with headquarters in this city. Timber owners and others interested in this new law, and who are familiar with Mr. Bartrum's past work, are desirous that he receive the appointment. The great number of endorsements which Mr. Bartrum is receiving from all parts of the state is excellent evidence of his ability to handle the affairs of so important an office. His qualifications in forestry work are well established in this state by reason of the many years' experience he has had in the government service, in which he has been eminently successful and given general satisfaction.
