Rice in Oregon may soon become an accomplished fact for experiments have been undertaken on a tract of irrigated land at Stayton, where a dozen varieties of rice will be planted as soon as the land can be gotten into condition. The work is in charge of Charles Chambliss, a government expert in the cultivation of rice. About ten acres will be used experimentally, use of the tract having been given by the owners of the property. The land will be seeded at once and irrigated throughout its growing season.
