What is a Dollar?

What is a dollar to you? Did you ever stop a moment to contemplate what the big round silver disc or the slip of paper with the mystic symbol \$ really signifies in your life? To some it is the almighty, to others but a germ-laden necessary medium between comfort and misery. Geo. W. Anderson in the National Magazine, has some original thoughts along this line worth reading. He says:

A dollar—what is it? "A piece of paper," says one. No, more than that. "Circulating medium," says one. No, more than that. "Something that you borrowed from your friend," says another. No, more than that. I worked hard yesterday and earned a dollar. I might have spent it in a minute's time and been no richer for the investment, but I did not spend it. It was the only tangible thing I had out of the whole day's existence. The joy, the opportunity, and the privileges of the day had gone into the silence of the eternity that has passed. That dollar is my yesterday. I may spend it, and start to-morrow bankrupt. I may keep it and to-morrow need not work at all, because my yesterday's dollar will pay for the services of one who may do the work better than myself; or, I may work again to-morrow and the next day, and the next, and save my yesterdays until I have long years of yesterdays strong and capable of toil, who shall labor for me and keep me in comfort when my body is too weak to toil. A dollar is part of a man's life, and as he guards his health to take care of the future, so should he guard his dollars to secure the full service of the past.

Rusty Mountain.

We now will leave Butler Mountain and proceed to look for other fields of observation. Following the trail which passes upward, we cross the South Sixes river and come onto the Bear pen flat; at the upper edge of this flat use to stand an old cabin, the bear pen; a little below, myself and three other men attempted to sink a prospect shaft with the intention of finding the old river bed; however, hard work without pay has cooled off many a prospector, so here, at the depth of twelve feet, the first of the company left us to go home and see mother; then the second one and the third one gave up and leaving me alone I was compelled to follow the rest.

Some of these days some pushing parties may take it up and go deeper and will, without doubt of failure, find the old river bed, there to strike it rich. From Bear pen we cross Huckleberry flat; a once tremendous mountain slide, which, at the time this happened, forced the river out of its original bed and washed a new channel there where it flows now.

The next flat we reach, its name has passed my memory, there we climb some very steep hills; upon the top we find an old elk trail and follow such until we are at the eastern end of Rusty mountain; here, too, stood an old board house; like

Bear pen, it was set afire.

Years ago the Harrison boys and their father made their home here and did some successful mining. The gold found here is of an entirely different character. It is a gold, which no doubt is forming even at the present time, found only in decomposed manganese and this only in veins of porphyry, such as have formed on the level; any other direction of such veins is bare.

The color is very pale yellow as much silver is alloyed with it. The value is only sixteen dollars an ounce, some of it of less value.

A mountain slide which broke off from Rusty mountain filling up the ravines leading to Rusty creek, no doubt has washed quantities of this metal into the creek and thence it worked its way clear to the ocean.

Different parties in former years worked high bars with good results; now there are but pockets there and it is hard to say whether many are left. The Harrison boys were extremely good prospectors, and strong willing and hard working miners.

From here Salmon mountain is in sight and appears not far off; so it is, but the steepness of the mountains to climb down and the same difficulties from the middle fork of Sixes up to the top of Salmon is not a light march. In former years this was the home of many deer, but hunters have destroyed hundreds of them; not to use the meat, but only to slaughter, to destroy. Those brainless persons have succeeded remarkably well, not many being left.

At one trip I made over this part there were eight deer which had died from wounds received by such men, not one had been found by the murderers of those innocent and graceful animals.

The game warden at that time was a deaf and dumb man who could not hear a shot fired right behind him.

At one time a number lodged over night in an old shack; accidentally some blasting powder, which was hid alongside the chimney, exploded, knocked the roof off of the house, and threw the game warden upon the floor; after raising up he inquired—"What was that?" — POHL.
