## Big Immigration.

The biggest month in colonization movements Oregon has ever had has just closed, bringing thousands of new citizens to the state. Favorable rates attracted people from all parts of the country who are valuable additions to the population. Every part of the state has profited by the heavy gain in new people.

It is up to the older residents to make the new comers feel at home for if they like this state they will induce their friends back home to come out also.

## Competitive Gardens for Children.

"If children take an interest in agricultural work" writes Clifton H. Woodhams in the May Sunset Magazine, "or if some outside inducement is offered to attract them to it, many hours which might not be spent to so good an advantage will be taken up with a healthful and pleasant occupation. In a recent garden contest in Palo Alto, Santa Clara Valley, California, eighty-seven boys and girls entered the contest and about fifty gardens yielded excellent results. The committee bought the seeds and bulbs and supplied them to the children at the regular price, so that no one child had an advantage over another. The prizes were bright silver dollars in small envelopes. Both the girls and boys who entered the contest enjoyed the work in addition to the financial results, some of them keeping up their gardens for their own pleasure and improvement.

## Big Experiments in Apples and Pears.

The department of horticulture at the Oregonian Agricultural College is doing pollination work on an extensive scale in apple and pear orchards this year near Medford and Hood river. Four men—R. W. Reese, assisted by J. M. Spidel of Edmund, Okla., Ray Roberts of Lebanon, Linn county, and C. C. Thompson of Hood river—have been at Medford experimenting on crossing, in the orchards there, and studying various problems concerning the setting of pears and apples.

A corps of the college men will shortly go to Hood river to take up the study of some special problems there.

For three years work has been done on problems as to sterility and fertility of apples there, and the mutual affinity of all the leading varieties up there. This year special difficulties in handling Spitzenbergers will be taken up. Trees of varying vigor will be studied to learn what influences such conditions as their fertility or sterility.

For the first time work will be conducted at Freewater and in the Milton district and a part of the Walla Walla valley. The problems will be in connection with the special fruits grown there in that region, to determine whether the climatic conditions there cause any variations from data already collected in other regions. Special studies are to be

made of the Jonathan, Rome Beauty and Winesap apples.

At the home station at the college E. J. Krause, assisted by others of the horticultural department, is going to conduct elaborate series of studies and experiments. Their work is to be more along the line of but study as to the development and differentiation of apple buds.

Prof. V. R. Gardner has started a series of studies of the blossoms of the prune and cherry, along the line of preliminary studies of breeding work he hopes to take up this coming year with these fruits. We shall first determine the fertility or sterility of the leading varieties of prunes and cherries. From the studies obtained we hope to get a certain percentage of seedlings which indicate the stability and unit characters of these varieties.

J. D. Griffin of Astoria, Clatsop county, a junior student, will assist Mr. Gardner.

## Self Governing Students.

It will be remembered that the students at the State Agricultural college at Corvallis have been trusted to govern themselves. The new system passed its first serious test when the sophomores refrained from molesting the freshmen on the occasion of their annual party. Hilarious jollity, shown in violent interference with the freshman in going to and from their party, with an occasional neglect of the boundaries between college and private belongings to the detriment of the college—all this has been the regular feature of the day for years past. Special guards and officers have all proved ineffective, and the kicking over the traces in every direction has been the custom—until now.

The student body is organized and has accepted the responsibilities of self government. Order and decency of behavior are not the only gains, for they are only the outward and visible sign of the inward grace. The distinction has been made plain between the over grown school boy, or school girl, of past years, and the college student of to-day. Being no longer children they have put away childish things. Guards and officers have disappeared. The orders of the "student body" are sufficient.

So the college scores once more in the behavior of its students. They have been trusted because they could be trusted, and have made good, says the Oregon Journal; and it might be added that the Bandon high school started the student self government movement even before the State Agricultural College did, and it has proved a big success here.

## Facts Regarding Oregon's Forests.

Oregon has one-fifth of the standing timber of the United States, or about 500,000,000,000 feet.

This timber is worth on the stump, not less than \$600,000,000 and if manufactured will bring in over \$6,000,000,000 of outside money. It will either be manufactured or destroyed by fire.

Oregon's forests already distribute more wealth in the state than apples, fish, wool and wheat combined. Cutting has hardly begun.

Of the revenue received from our lumber 80 per cent goes for labor and supplies.

Last year approximately 1,750,000,000 feet of timber was killed by fire, representing a value of not less than \$2,000,000 in stumpage alone. Over 1,000,000,000 feet of the timber killed was on private lands outside national forests.

Six human lives were lost in this state last summer through forest fires, the homes of many settlers burned and live stock on the range destroyed.

Timber owners are spending each year for fire protection about \$130,000, the Federal Government spends for patrol \$150,000, and under this law the State has at its command for the protection of its forests, \$60,000 for the next two years.

Oregon's timbered area is approximately 25,000,000 acres. Of this amount one-half is patrolled by the Federal Government, the rest must be looked after by the state and the private owner.
