Curry County Has its Own Harbors.

The Bandon Recorder of last week contained an article commenting upon the fact that the steamer Elizabeth laid off Port Orford two days recently attempting to make a landing, and the Recorder went on further to state that this demonstrated that Bandon was the natural seaport for Curry county.

The Recorder man forgets to mention that the Elizabeth laid off Port Orford because she could not cross the Bandon bar; he forgets to mention that but a short time ago vessels were bar-bound at Bandon for ten days or so while Port Orford harbor was like a mill pond; he forgets to mention that thousands of dollars have been spent on the Bandon harbor and not a cent at Port Orford; he forgets to mention that we have to day a better harbor than Bandon for eight months in the year, and that when it is improved, as it eventually must be, it will be without a peer for hundreds of miles along the Pacific coast.

No, Bandon, your Port will never be the outlet for this county. You are now getting all the business down this way you can ever expect to get, and more than you will get when future developments come. With Chetco, Rogue river and Port Orford, Curry county will never suffer for an egress to the ocean says the Port Orford Tribune. Now, why didn't the Tribune man add the coming harbor of Lakeport to Chetco, Rogue river and Port Orford? They are all on about the same par, and Lakeport, which will not be a harbor in a thousand years, stands as good a chance to become one however as the other places mentioned. Yes, Mr. Tribune Man, you will have to admit that Bandon is still and will continue to be the harbor for Curry county.

Editor Bandon Recorder: Time after time yourself as well as other papers have given reasons why every good citizen should deal with the merchants in the town where his or their interest calls him to do business, be that work in the town or on the farm in the vicinity of such town.

You explain matters very well as it should be but fail to point out things as they are but should not be.

If merchants will continue the credit system as they have done, credit every one who asks for it, they must expect that such a system will be only too often abused by people who find it very easy to get all they want on credit, and all they have to do is not to pay, and when their face value has declined in one store they go to the next and so on, is the last store convinced that such certain customer is N. G. and such dishonest customer finds that the end has come, and all that is needed to do is to hunt up a new field in another location and add more of his or her dishonestly, low principled self to the former experience and make some more victims? or fools?

No, no fools; the merchant has good customers who pay cash, or

weekly or monthly, but they pay their debts, that is enough.

No dealer, in whatever line of goods he does business, will or can stand one loss after the other without failure becomes the result.

To overcome such consequences the prices of all goods are raised and the increased profit helps the merchant to balance accounts.

To the dishonest buyer it makes no difference what things cost, he don't pay anyhow, nor will he go to a store order house.

The cash customer on the other side finds he can much improve his accounts by leaving such a town merchant and send cash with order somewhere else, receives full weight and satisfactory merchandise at a much reduced price.

One after the other of the cash customers troop off to buy in town and the merchants has the D. G. and N. G. left to carry goods out, but fails to come with his C. O. D.

Merchants, don't you buy where you get the best for the least? If you don't do so it is your own business, but others have the same right to do the best they can for themselves.

If it is your desire to hold the good customer you must keep your black list; not only one merchant in the town, but all combined; give credit for one, two, four weeks, and no longer. If you allow the growth of dishonesty, take the consequences. List your customers. Save yourself from being buncoed and encourage honest dealing and cash customers. How? Well, you know how. A small discount for cash and the lowest possible prices will do it.

Oregon's Newest Town.

North Plains, Ore., April (Special)—Sixty days ago North Plains, Oregon's newest town, had a population of less than a dozen persons

and on the townsite stood a frame building, a tent and the framework to the water tower. Sunday, April 16th, North Plains suddenly claimed a permanent population of 200 with 40 buildings complete or nearly so. Streets are graded, sidewalks laid, water and lighting systems available to all town property and portions of the acreage and several brick buildings contemplated.

North Plains is a necessity. Port land business men realized this when they formed an excursion party to the new town two weeks ago and assisted the citizens in the organization of the North Plains Commercial club, the latest addition to the Oregon Development League. In sixty days North Plains has added two lumber yards, a creamery, brick plant, fruit cannery, meat packing plant, coal and wood yards with several new industries contemplated.

The town of North Plains is the metropolis of the Tualatin valley, one of the richest sections of the state, but which has been without transportation until the building of the United Railways. A tunnel, 4,100 feet, was built through solid rock to maintain a uniform grade and permit the fast running trains from Portland. Within a radius of a few miles of North Plains are 50,000 acres of fertile soil, 3,000,000 feet of fine timber and several thousand acres that can be devoted to fruit culture. Large farms are being subdivided into tracts of from one to ten acres with a view of settling up the valley.

North Plains is already getting ready for an agricultural fair and celebration July 4th.
