SHEEP WISDOM.

Pregnant ewes had about as well be turned out among wolves as to be left where the other stock bump and kick them around, as this is one cause of weak, paralyzed or dead lambs at lambing time.

The flock should be kept happy and contented by the constant and watchful care of the shepherd. Little things count much in the care of a flock.

Bran and linseed meal are the best grains to feed the ewes. Wheat bran and linseed meal contain a large percentage of protein, which is a necessity to a breeding animal. Give a variety of small potatoes, apples and roots with the grain ration.

Be sure there is no crowding at the feed rack as the ewes grow heavy with lamb.

The ewe should be strong and vigorous when she drops her lamb. If the ewe is thin and weak, there will be no profit in her lamb.

Those who have been raising sheep in recent years have had no reason to complain. A flock well cared for adds substantially to the farm profits and exacts but a minimum of care.
