Cause of Bitter Milk.

Bitter milk is invariably due to germs which develop when the milk has been kept at a very low temperature. Very seldom, if ever, any bitter milk is developed in the summer time, unless it is held in exceptionally cold water for several days. The way to get rid of the bitter taste in the milk is to thoroughly scald all the milking utensils, pails, cans, etc., and then keep the milk at a temperature of not less than 55 degrees F.—Hoard's Dairyman

Treating Wounds on Sheep.

If sheep become incarcinated on wire fence or other objects, watch the wound carefully and if maggots appear wash the wounds with a weak solution of carbolic acid and water. If the wounds are deep and difficult to reach, inject the solution with a syringe.

THE PROFITABLE HOG.

It costs money to make mistakes in pig feeding. The breeding sows should be fed carefully, so that when the pigs are born they may be strong and healthy and in condition to begin a rapid growth. Quick and steady growth from start to finish means economical gains, says the Farm Journal. The returns from growing pigs are so quick that it pays to practice intelligent and up to date methods. Give the brood sow the most careful, intelligent attention at all times and the battle is more than half won. It is poor economy to neglect the brood sow, as she is one of the most profitable possessions on the farm. Begin to plan now for the pig pastures next summer to insure health and profit for the pigs. Put the turdies in order so that the pastures can be divided and changed. Keep the pigs on their feet as much as possible hunting for dainties. Feed well, but also keep them hungry enough to take a lot of exercise looking for more food. Be sure the pigs have plenty of pure, clean water to drink.

HANDLING THE COLT.

Kindness and Firmness Make His Education Easy.

I have seen colts broken at two years old with whip and main force, but I think my way is best, the way we trained ours, writes C. E. Davis in Farm and Fireside. His training began when he was only one day old, when we freely handled him all over. When a few weeks old he was taught to stand up to a low manger and lick bran out of a trough. Later oats were added, and when we wanted to halter him the halter was laid open on top of the oats. As soon as he stuck his nose in the loop the straps were softly gathered up and buckled, and he was tied. We were careful to use a strong halter, for a colt breaking a weak or old halter will make an incurable halter breaker, unsafe to tie at any time.

Every day the colt was taught to lead, to back, go "gee" or "haw" and stop short at "whoa." This was done with coaxing, an apple or two, and slight taps on ankles with a light switch if he got stubborn. He soon learned to obey the pushes and pulls and kind words. Rough usage, a loud, impatient manner or a whip or big stick will get a colt confused and frightened, and if the trainer loses his temper the colt is likely to be spoiled forever. He should respect his trainer, but not fear him.

Whether leading or driving a colt, never let him jerk or break away from you, for once it learns its power it is likely to develop into a runaway. In leading a colt take a short, firm grip on the halter and do not trust old men or children for this work.

Every day practice picking up all the colt's feet and tap them lightly with hammer or a stone so that the colt will learn to be shod. Do not make him stand so long as to get tired and lean on you for support, for a "leaner" is the terror of any blacksmith. When the colt is first worked let it be light work at first, only a few hours, and never, never make him pull to the full of his strength. I have seen more young horses ruined for life through this one thing than any other.

Teach them to stop short when you tell them, and don't be yelling "whoa-whoa-whoa" when you want them to go slow, and not stop for sometimes in case of danger you may shout "whoa" and they won't stop in time. The great secret of all the colt's education is in variable kindness and firmness. When you give him an order make him obey it by repeated trials. When he gets tired of the training or stubborn simply let him alone until next day. To try to show him "who is master" merely undoes all the good you have already done.

Oats For Growing Hogs.

Oats can be fed whole successfully to breeding and growing hogs, but for young pigs they are not so good as ground oats from which the hulls have been sifted, which make one of the best feeds that can be secured. Whole oats are a very good feed for brood sows and add some bulk to the feed, besides helping to furnish a well balanced ration. Whole oats scattered thinly on the ground or feeding floor make fine feed for brood sows. For fattening hogs oats are too bulky and high priced to give the best results and should not be depended upon for this purpose.
