WORK OF GRANGES

Facts Concerning Co-operative
Buying and Selling in the
Various States.

The Grange Declaration of Purposes
Says, "We Purpose Meeting Together,
Talking Together, Buying To-
gether, Selling Together and in Gen-
eral Acting Together as the Occasion
May Require."

State Master Stetson of Maine in his
annual address said: "Intelligent co-
operative buying and selling is a
fundamental principle in our grange
work. It is a term applied to a system
of united effort for commercial and in-
dustrial purposes. It is the association
of people for the management of com-
mercial interests and for the benefit
of those associated. The advantage
of active co-operation comes in the
lower prices paid for articles used in
the home and on the farm and for the
increased price received by selling the
products of the farm directly to the
consumer."

Co-operative trade since the founda-
tion of the Order has always been a
prominent feature of the grange work.
Years ago grange stores were more
numerous than now. And yet we find
a few of these in the various states
that are doing a large business, but
co-operation is mostly carried on by
county and subordinate granges within
their own membership, and they gen-
erally profit thereby. Co-operative selling
must be largely of a local nature. It
can be most successfully carried out
by subordinate and Pomona granges.
For instance, some of the Pomona
granges of Maine have realized this
and are at work selling together, with
the following as their motto: "First,
the expansion of both foreign and do-
mestic products in Maine; second, to
obtain and disseminate reasonable in-
formation regarding the crops abroad
that come into competition with their
home grown products, so that the
Maine producer may more intelligently
decide whether to sell or hold his crops
for higher prices; third, to devise and
carry out a proper system of market-
ing products whereby a maximum price
shall be obtained with minimum cost
in selling."

The Connecticut Patrons' Exchange
is doing a substantial but not very
large business, amounting perhaps to
\$100,000 per year. But even at that
it is saving many good dollars to mem-
bers.

In Michigan the granges are very ac-
tive in a business way. A single
grange in the fruit belt purchased 5,000
pounds of copper sulphate, two car-
loads of lime and a carload of sulphur
and a ton of paris green. Another
grange in the same state placed a sin-
gle order for a ton of paris green.
Trainloads of binder twine are pur-
chased every year by grangers. An
other grange purchased \$7,000 worth
of flour and feed.

In Ohio the state grange through
its trade contracts handled \$500,000
worth of farmers' commodities. The
fertilizer business constituted \$25,433
of this amount, making a saving of
fully \$1,250 on fertilizers.

One grange store in Kansas carries
goods to the amount of \$140,000, and
the granges in that state are doing a
large co-operative business. The ex-
ecutive committee of the state grange
is working on plans for a state wide
co-operative buying agency. One
grange insurance company in that
state has a membership of 4,167 and
carries risks to the amount of \$11,
659,216. The cost on each \$1,000 of
insurance was \$1.90.

In New York state several hundred
thousand dollars in trade is handled
by trade contracts, and the county and
subordinate granges are saving their
members hundreds of dollars on farm
supplies. Nearly every grange state
where the grange membership is in
considerable numbers is making this
co-operative trade a most profitable
feature. Pennsylvania is especially
notable for its co-operative fire in-
surance companies, telephone com-
panies and particularly for co-operation
in erecting grange halls.

Farmers everywhere are learning
that they can succeed best by work-
ing together, and co-operative enter-
prises established by farmers not
members of the Order of Patrons of
Husbandry are also numerous and
profitable. For instance, the Payalup
and Summer Fruit Growers' associa-
tion of Washington state has 700 mem-
bers and shipped last year over 62,000
crates of red raspberries and nearly
20,000 crates of blackberries, its own
canning plant using 20,000 crates of
raspberries and 44,000 crates of black-

berries. Ten years ago its output did
not exceed 5,000 crates. Now it is
over 200,000 crates. This association
was organized with a capital of \$2,000
in 2,000 shares.

At Voltaire, N. D., the farmers own
several co-operative enterprises. In-
deed, they own the town site and a
telephone line. They own an elevator,
which last year a dividend of 29
per cent was declared. They have a
farmers' mutual fire insurance com-
pany. They organized a stock com-
pany and constructed a building.

There are almost innumerable ways
in which farmers may co-operate if
they are willing to work together for
their common interests.

ASPHALT FOR ROADS.

Will Make Excellent Binding, Says
London Engineer.

Cecil Nathan, an engineer of Lon-
don who gives especial attention to
roadmaking, expresses the belief that
asphalt is destined to take the place
of tar as a binder of macadam roads.
He defines the "essential desiderata"
of a satisfactory road as "smooth ap-
pearance and even surface following
the contour of the road, which must
be sanitary, dustless, noiseless and
non-slippery." Mr. Nathan also stipu-
lates that the ideal road must not only
have these qualities, but be reasonable
in initial cost and above all in main-
tenance.

"Many of the present generation will
remember the phrase, 'Electricity is
only in its infancy,' says Mr. Nathan.
"Well, today the road board is in its
infancy, and I have no doubt that it
will grow into as fine and healthy a
child as electricity did. Like other in-
fants, the road board is just beginning
to speak, and the first word that it
has been taught is 'tar.' Now, I hope it
will very soon grow up and learn
words of two syllables, such as 'as-
phalt,' and then be able to expound
to road engineers the real meaning of
this much misunderstood word.

"This is the tar age, and as an in-
different palliative tar is serving its
purpose today as a temporary expedi-
ent, but something much more perma-
nent than the primitive methods of tar
spraying or even tar macadam is re-
quired for the future, and I maintain
that permanency will be obtained only
from the adoption of waterproof road
crust binders of either Lake Trinidad
asphalt or Cuban asphalt, but prefer-
ably Cuban asphalt, owing to its hav-
ing a higher melting point and its abil-
ity to withstand the roting effects of
water."

Oil Concrete Road.

The first stretch of oil concrete high-
way to be laid in Pennsylvania has just
recently been completed on the Harris-
burg-Lingestown road. It is about a
quarter of a mile in length and is be-
tween Progress and Paxtonia. The oil
concrete road is an experiment on the
part of the state highway department,
which in 1907 rebuilt the highway from
the eastern terminus of the city to Paxtonia.

The section just laid replaces a quar-
ter of a mile of road constructed of
concrete. The new section of road is
made of concrete into which are mixed
asphaltic oils. The top surface is not
arched so much as the rest of the road,
the crown being constructed on a basis
of three-eighths of an inch to a foot.
The crown is the same as that used in
laying a brick pavement.
