Important News of the State

Portland, Or., July 6 (Special)—Great benefit is expected to result to Interior Oregon from the selection during the past week of an experiment station site in Harney County near Burns. The location was picked by experts from the Oregon Agricultural College and a tract of 160 acres was selected. A capable man from the college will be placed in charge and soil problems of the interior will be solved. Proper dry farming methods will be shown and the station will serve as a nucleus for a number of other experimental farms throughout Harney County. Later it is hoped others will be established in Eastern Oregon.

A new industry has been started in Gresham, where a Japanese woman has a thriving colony of silk worms that she has raised from imported cocoons this spring. The worms are now spinning their silk and will soon develop into the butterfly stage.

September 1 is the date set for opening the railroad from Portland to Tillamook and people in that corner of the state will have a big celebration when the first train reaches Tillamook Bay from Portland.

The Pacific Highway Convention will be held in Portland August 3 and 5 and arrangements will be made by the Portland Automobile Club and representatives from every prominent city on the coast are expected to attend. A number of automobilists will come down in their cars from Seattle. Some good work may be expected for good roads as the result of this convention and particularly for the great highway projected along the coast line from Canada to Mexico.

That the whole state will be represented in framing proposed good roads legislation is assured now that Governor West has named a commission of prominent men from all parts of Oregon to assist in the work. It is believed this will prevent a flood of hasty legislation at the next election and will give the entire state just what is needed for highway betterment.

Mining men will meet at Grants Pass on July 18. The recent find of rich gold ore in Southern Oregon will probably make the coming convention a very interesting one. Invitations to attend the gathering have sent to commercial bodies and mining organizations of the whole coast.

Division Superintendent is General Manager.

The division superintendent of a railroad should be the general manager of his division, and all activities of that division should be directly under his control, is the opinion of E. E. Calvin, vice president and general manager of the Southern Pacific Company, who is a strong advocate of the policy of undivided responsibility. The theory is that an official of a division should be directly under the jurisdiction of the head of the division on which he is working.

The management of the Southern Pacific Company has for many years endeavored to carry out this idea. The latest move is a circular, which follows, just issued from the office of the vice president and general manager.

"Effective July 1, 1911, all division stores, division storekeepers and their employes, will be placed under the control and direction of the respective Division Superintendents, who, in turn, as to store and supply matters, will be under the control of the General Storekeeper. The office files of division stores should be consolidated with those of the division superintendent to whom all communications will be addressed by the general storekeeper. The general storekeeper will be held responsible by the general manager for division stocks and for the uniform, economical and efficient management by superintendents of division stores.

"Material accounting forces of division stores should be consolidated with the division accounting bureau. Wherever practicable, the division storekeeper and his accounting and correspondence forces should be moved to the same building with the superintendent, leaving the necessary issue clerks at the store.

"The accounting department will prepare detailed instructions covering the accounting features of these changes."

One of the means of carrying out the instructions of this circular is the consolidation of office files, concentration of many branches of a business being made possible by this method, all readily supervised by one head. Another process, when practicable, is the housing of all division officers in one building, thus bringing every minute part of the division closer together. In this latter connection, the Southern Pacific Company has already done much to bring its officers more closely together, and in this manner the Company has promoted a more intimate acquaintance among those of all branches of the Southern Pacific Company's activities, and has encouraged personal conferences among them for the purpose of interchange of experience, observations and suggestions. The order of the circular will be same effective on the first of July.

Surveys of the mouth of the Columbia River completed during the past week, are expected to show an increased depth of the ship channel at the river's mouth. A gain of 18 inches, a total depth of 27 1/2 feet, is unofficially reported. The measurements just made show that the sweep of the river current and the tides are effective when confined to the channel and the increasing depth demonstrates the value of the jetty work at the mouth of the river.

Portland Live Stock Market.

Portland—July 1, 1911. Receipts for the past week have been: Cattle 1250, calves 805, hogs 2121, sheep 7117 and horses and mules 28.

The supply of cattle coming on the market this week has just about supplied the demands of the trade, therefore the market remains firm and prices steady at tops quoted heretofore. A good many California steers on the market, well finished, medium weights, around 1150 lbs., easily brought 6.25, a remarkable price for grass cattle. Buyers are anxious to secure good cattle of this type and willing to pay the price. One lot of extra choice heifers brought 5.75 creating a sensation in the cow market, good cows brought from 5.00 to 5.25 with very few offerings.

In the face of good receipts and fancy prices prevailing the veal division deserves a separate paragraph this week. Although calves are beginning to come in, in car load lots, prices remain steady at former tops, 7.50 was paid for several cars of good, light well finished stuff while the heavier classes range from 6.00 to 6.50.

The hog market continues to advance with very few local swine in evidence. Best light hogs brought 7.15 this week and heavy hogs advanced another notch, now being quoted at from 6.00 to 6.85, owing to quality.
