

Roads Overpaid is the charge

Washington, June 20.—Uncle Sam has been paying the railroads a little more than \$9,000,000 a year more than the service for carrying the mails is worth.

This is postmaster General Hitchcock's latest announcement with respect to inside affairs pertaining to the postal service. Congress is to be asked to authorize a readjustment of railway mail pay so that this \$9,000,000 a year may be saved to the government.
