Mayor Mast's Address

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Your attention is especially directed to the volunteer fire department that the city has been endeavoring to foster. You will find on investigation that the equipment is inadequate to the needs of the department, and there has not been perfect concord between the council and the department. You should spare no efforts to place it upon a working basis and make such appropriation as will be necessary for proper equipment.

STREETS

The closing year has witnessed much activity in street improvement. The healthy growth of the city has warranted it. You will find your attention constantly directed to this phase of your work. You will find from prevailing conditions that in the dedication of plats and streets, public interest has been made subservient to private whim; that streets are being improved to the outer limits of the city, while some terminating in its commercial center are not even dedicated and can not be touched until drastic measures are taken to secure jurisdiction. You will be impelled to investigate the possibility of extending First Street to connect with Woodland Addition, and another year should not be permitted to lapse without the accomplishment of this end. Public opinion, commercial interests, symmetrical arrangement of streets and unbiased private judgement combine to force it to a living issue. If this one thing only is achieved, you will not have served your city in vain. Much more that might be said may here be omitted that this thought may become paramount with you.

Believing that in your selection the electors have chosen well, relying firmly upon your ability to investigate the further needs of the city, I submit only the foregoing suggestions for your inspection. It is hoped that in the exercise of our official duties, in our deliberations here and in committee, that we will find it possible to preserve such decorum and contention of action as best becomes men of our position, looking ever to the greatest good to the greatest number. A loyal citizenship is back of us, and we are confronted with an ambitious and prosperous inclination that will need such official clemency and support, as we may find it possible to grant. May the official year close with none delinquent as to the duties he is chosen to perform.
