Cooking Vegetables.

All cooks do not understand the different effects produced by hard and soft waters in cooking meat and vegetables. Peas and beans cooked in hard water containing lime or gypsum will not boil tender, because these substances harden vegetable tissue. Many vegetables, as onions, boil nearly tasteless in soft water, because all the flavor is boiled out. The addition of salt often checks this, as in the case of onions, causing the vegetable to retain the peculiar flavoring principles, besides such nutritious matter as might be lost in soft water.
