WHEN THE PIGS COME.

Proper Treatment of Sow and Litter at
Farrowing Time.

Two weeks before the pigs are expected the sow should be placed in a farrowing pen connected with a dry yard large enough to allow her to exercise. Her bowels should be kept loose. She should have dry, sunny shelter, free from drafts. The sow should be petted, so that she will like to have her feeder handle her.

Give the sow all the water she wants for the first twenty-four hours after the pigs are born, but no grain.



The head of the Berkshire boar shown herewith approaches the ideal as accepted by breeders. The tendency in recent years has been to produce an extremely pug nosed animal, and, commenting on this, a Berkshire breeder said: "My experience is that a hog with this kind of nose is not as thrifty or as growthy as any of the other pigs in the herd that have reasonably good heads. A good head, as is described in the standard of excellence, is wide, broad between the eyes and ears, with nicely shaped face. Now, nicely shaped does not mean a pug nose, with the lower jaw longer than the upper, or one that snuffles or snuffles in the least. It is a head that is in balance with the rest of the animal and in proportion in every way."

Take the chill off the water in cold weather. For three or four days after the first twenty-four hours give plenty of water, but feed grain and milk sparingly. Then slowly increase until, when the pigs are three weeks old, the sow is having all the feed she will consume. Give the pigs exercise and sunshine from birth, but do not allow them to get damp nor to be exposed to the wind.

When the sow is given a warm, rich slop or other milk producing feeds just after her pigs are born a strong milk flow is forced. The newborn pigs get too much and have diarrhea, which often kills them.

Watch the sow and pigs and slowly increase her food as fast as the pigs can take more milk. At the end of two weeks after farrowing she should be given all the milk producing feeds she will eat. Pasture, skim milk, tankage, shorts, wheat, gluten feed and the hay from alfalfa, clover, peas and peanuts are among the best milk producing feeds.

Corn and barley in moderate quantities are good, but must be fed with large quantities of the milk yielding feeds. An excess of either of these grains is certain to bring on thumps, one of the most fatal of the diseases of young pigs. Like all growing animals, the pigs must have hours of exercise every day.

Pigs will begin to nibble at feed when they are about three weeks old. At this age they should be given a little milk in a trough separate from the mother. After they get to drinking the milk freely add a little soaked whole grain—barley, wheat, peas, milo or corn. Do not give more than they will eat up clean at one time, and clean the trough well before each feeding.

Pigs should not be weaned until they are at least eight weeks old, and if the sow is not to have a second litter, or if there is time enough in case she is, it is better to let the pigs suckle until they are ten or twelve weeks old.—Professor H. M. Cottrell in Kansas Farmer.

About Cottonseed Meal.

It has been found by experiment that young animals and especially pigs cannot survive long upon cottonseed meal and that when fed to them for any length of time it becomes fatal. Hunt of the Pennsylvania station reports the death of two calves out of three from feeding a ration of one pound of cottonseed meal with sixteen pounds of skim milk. Emery of the North Carolina station reports the death of two calves following the use of one-fourth to one-half pound of cottonseed meal daily with skim milk. So far as investigations go they indicate very strongly that cottonseed meal should not be fed to young animals.—Hoard's Dairyman.

Oats and Peas as a Sowing Crop.

Perhaps as good a crop as we could suggest for sowing purposes during the months of July and August would be to sow peas and oats, says Hoard's Dairyman. When this crop is sowed the 15th of April it will be ready to use by the 1st of July. Two weeks later the second sowing can be made, and so on until enough has been sowed to carry the herd through the months of July and August. It is customary to sow one and one-half bushels of oats and one-half bushels of peas per acre. One-eighth of an acre sown at a time would, under favorable conditions, furnish sufficient forage for three cows.

The Wild Giraffe.

Perhaps the most difficult of all wild animals to capture is the giraffe. In addition to being very rare, giraffes are exceedingly timid and are very swift footed. There is no special way to capture a giraffe, as almost every way has been tried, and all have been almost equally unsuccessful. The method which has occasionally resulted in a capture is by using a long cord, at each end of which is a round weight. This cord is thrown by the hunter in such a manner as to wind round the animal's legs, either bringing it to the ground or rendering it incapable of escaping before it is made a prisoner. Most of the giraffes in captivity have been caught when young.
