## Monthly Digest of Important Public Land Decisions.

The following important law points have recently been decided by the Secretary of the Interior.

### JULY DIGEST

#### HOMESTEADS

When an entryman had made a former homestead entry of less than 160 acres for which he acquired title, he was not qualified to make an entry under the reclamation act.

The act of March 2, 1889 (25 Stat. 854) has no application to entries under the reclamation act, and the additional right granted in said act of March 2, 1889, cannot be exercised by entry within a reclamation project. Citing instructions, June 16, 1909. (38 L. D. 58.)

When a claimant made entry for a technical quarter-section of land, and after five years' residence thereon obtained title thereto, he exhausted his right.

The fact that the land patented lacked a little more than two acres of making 160 acres did not give him the status of a qualified homestead entryman or the right to enter under the enlarged homestead act, an additional 320 acres.

Extenuating circumstances in favor of entryman will not justify the Department charged with the duty of disposing of the public lands in the manner provided by law, to dispose of them contrary to the express provisions of that law.

A homestead entry must be canceled as a mere pretext of residence and improvement where it is shown that the entryman merely made occasional visits to the land, where he merely had a house furnished with stove and dishes, it being shown that the entryman was in partnership in a threshing machine and other farm machinery.

The Coquille Sentinel rather rubs it into Bandon fans for not coming up there when there is a ball game on and goes on to tell about what a bunch from Coquille comes to Bandon every time there is a game, but the Sentinel doesn't seem to realize that there is a difference, and that when Coquillers come down here they have some place to go and amuse themselves until time for the game; they can go to the beach all the way on the sidewalk, they can go to the woods, and in fact there are many places of interest here for people to entertain themselves, while at Coquille there is nothing to do but go to the hotel and sit around until the game is called. If Coquille would get busy and get up something to induce people to come the thing might be different. This is not meant as a slam at Coquille, but merely to call the attention of the Sentinel to a few facts that might be remedied.

## Three Good Boxing Contests for Carnival.

Jack Tawse, manager of the Bandon Athletic Club, has succeeded in securing three fast boxing contests for the carnival week. On the evening of August 24th at Oriental Hall, will be a big 20 round contest between "Rough House" Charlie Burns of Watsonville, California, aspiring light weight champion of the world, and Bobby Evans of Portland, champion light weight of Oregon.

This will probably be the fastest glove contest ever seen in southern Oregon as both of the boys are top notchers and will work to win.

A fast to round preliminary between Kid Gillen of Council Bluffs, Iowa and Sing Hosan of Hong Kong, China, will be pulled off the same night.

A match between Jess Day and Earl Chisholm, two well known boxers of southern Oregon, has also been arranged for another evening of the carnival. These two boys have fast records and will no doubt put up one of the snappiest scraps ever seen in this section of the country.

## County Values Increase \$4,262,654.

Coquille, Or., July 29.—County Assessor Thrift has finished the work of compiling the assessment roll for 1911, and the figures some remarkable comparisons. The total valuation of all property is \$19,777,536 as against \$15,514,912 last year. But 18,136 acres of land are assessed as tillable, while the area of the county is given at 894,813 acres. No railroad is assessed in the county, but 26 1/2 miles of logging road is in operation. It is assessed at \$1000 per mile. Horses to the number of 2620 are listed, while cattle number 12,874.

A remarkable feature of the assessment is the high value placed on tillable lands. The average for the county is \$73 per acre.

## Naval Militia not National Guard.

Owing to the fact that a few Bandonians have confused the Oregon Naval Militia, a division of which was organized here last week, with the National Guards, and have been working against the organization on that ground, a few words of explanation as to the difference between the two organizations might not come amiss and may be the means of putting some of the opposers on the right track.

The Oregon Naval Militia is not the Oregon National Guard nor is it affiliated in any way.

The last Oregon Legislature created the Oregon Naval Militia and appropriated \$25,000 to be used in its maintenance.

The state furnishes the enlisted men with two uniforms, guns, ammunition, and competent men to instruct them in the use of arms and in military tactics. It provides a place for drills and target practice, and pays all the expenses of the organization.

The War Department has loaned the State of Oregon the U. S. S. Boston, and once each year the state gives the boys the privilege of going on a 10 days' cruise, at which time they receive competent instruction in the mechanical department aboard the ship, in great gunnery and navigation, and give them an opportunity to see some of the world and get paid for it. The men in the Oregon Naval Militia receive the same pay on these cruises as do the regulars in the U. S. Navy, which is not less than \$26.00 per month and expenses.

What live young man does not take two weeks' vacation each year, and who would not be glad to avail himself of this opportunity for a profitable vacation and get paid well for it in the bargain?

And all the state asks in return for all this is one hour per week drill. THAT'S ALL. There are NO riot calls or anything of the kind. In fact, the Oregon Naval Militia has no duty on land. That duty belongs to the National Guard. The Naval Militia is purely a naval organization and is used only in coast defence and in the navy, and that duty is not any more binding on them than it is on any other citizen of the United States.

Another thing the Naval Militia can accomplish better than through any other source, and that is the improvement of the local harbor, as more can be done with the government through this organization than through any other source.

Those who confuse the Naval Militia with the National Guard are entirely mistaken, and if they will but take the trouble to investigate the situation they will be convinced of their error.

## Grange Held Regular Session

The Bandon Grange held its regular monthly meeting in I. O. O. F. hall Saturday. The usual luncheon was enjoyed at noon and a class of five received the third and fourth degrees. Messrs Crain and Laird, representing the carnival committee, were present at a special open session, and the question of the Grange cooperating with the carnival management was discussed. ## PORTION OF LIGHTHOUSE JETTY GOES DOWN

### Stretch of 220 feet Washed Out Sunday Night by Breakers

A portion of the light house jetty, 220 feet long, was washed down by the breakers Sunday night, and this, with what has previously gone out, makes a gap of nearly 400 feet that has been washed out.

The light house jetty was built only two years ago at a cost of about \$4,000 to the light house department and it would appear that it is impossible to build a jetty that will stand against the continual pounding of the surf in that particular place. It will be remembered by people who were here two years ago, how close the water came to undermining the dwelling of the light house keepers, and only for the erection of the jetty at that time, the building would have been in the sea in a few days.

There has been considerable agitation to move the light house across the river to a point near the lookout, and this proposition has the support of all the sea captains who come into this port, as they say that the light house where it now is, is a hindrance to coming in after night because the glaring light shines in their eyes blinding them in a way that they cannot see the channel; also it is impossible to see the light or hear the fog horn when approaching from the south, consequently the light house where it stands at present does not answer the purpose in any way, whereas if it were on the hill near the lookout, it could be seen from all directions, and the cost of up keep would be reduced to practically nothing; whereas it has cost nearly ten thousand dollars in the last few years where it now stands.
