Two Killed by Windstorm in Manitoba.

Winnipeg, Min. Aug. 21—A dispatch from Lyleton, in the south western corner of Manitoba, near the boundary line, states that the tornado which came from the west last evening and swept a large stretch of country, killed two men at Elmwood, who were in a barn that was blown down. A number of others were injured, but none fatally.

At Sherwood and Antler, close to the boundary line, four persons were killed, eight fatally injured and eight seriously hurt.
