WHEREAS, the said G. Boak and H. W. Dunham have entered into the copartnership hereinbefore referred to for the purpose of conducting a general steamboat and transportation business on the Coquille river.

NOW THEREFORE, the parties of the first part in consideration of said agreement of purchase and for the consideration in said agreement mentioned, they and each of them agree not to, directly or indirectly, engage in the steamboat or transportation business of any kind or description whatsoever upon the waters of the Coquille river between Coquille and Bandon in Coos County, Oregon, prior to the 1st day of January, 1912, without the written consent of parties of second part.
