A BOY AND HIS GOAT.

In Benton county, Ark., last year a fifteen-year-old boy raised fifty bushels of corn on an acre of dry, flinty hillside.

He did not belong to a corn club. The boy plowed the ground with a small plow which he made himself from iron that he found in a discarded scrap heap at a country blacksmith shop.

First:—

WAIT.

Wait.

Instrument of Agreement.

WHEREAS, G. Boak and H. W. Dunham of the parties of the second part have entered into an agreement of purchase of all the steamboats belonging to the parties of the first part; and

WHEREAS, said steamboats have been turned over to the said G. Boak and H. W. Dunham; and

WHEREAS, the said G. Boak and H. W. Dunham have entered into the copartnership hereinbefore referred to for the purpose of conducting a general steamboat and transportation business on the Coquille river.

NOW THEREFORE, the parties of the first part in consideration of said agreement of purchase and for the consideration in said agreement mentioned, they and each of them agree not to, directly or indirectly, engage in the steamboat or transportation business of any kind or description whatsoever upon the waters of the Coquille river between Coquille and Bandon in Coos county, Oregon, prior to the 1st day of January, 1912, without the written consent of parties of second part.

Notice to Establish Grade on Coquille Avenue.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos county, Oregon, did, on the 6th day of September, 1911, at a regular meeting by resolution duly passed, determine to establish the grade on Coquille Avenue, commencing on the north line of Sixth street where Coquille avenue intersects with Sixth street, thence running north to the south line of Atwater street where Coquille avenue intersects with Atwater street, all in the Warden Mill Addition to the City of Bandon, said grade is to be established in accordance with the survey and profile of the city engineer, now on file at the office of the City Engineer, and is open to the inspection of all persons interested therein.

NOW, unless a written remonstrance, signed by the owners of TWO-THIRDS of the real property adjacent to and abutting upon Coquille avenue, between the points herein described, shall be filed with the City Recorder within TWENTY (20) days from the first publication of this notice, the Common Council will pass an Ordinance establishing the Grade on Coquille avenue as herein proposed, and between points as herein described, in accordance with the survey and profile of the City Engineer as herein mentioned and now on file at the City Engineer's office.
