Steel Magnates Will Fight Law.

New York, Oct. 27.—Summoned to court to show cause why the billion dollar steel combine should not be dissolved because it is a trust and acting in restraint of trade, members of the corporation declare they will not be ousted from their position without a test of the law in all of its branches. The giants of finance met last night at the home of J. Pierpont Morgan and remained in consultation until early this morning. This afternoon Francis E. Stetson, chief counsel for the trust, said: "We know just where we stand and what we are charged with and we will act accordingly." U. S. Marshal Snowden is in New York to serve the individual members of the corporation with summons. Marshal Snowden has already gotten service on President Gary and is this afternoon looking for J. D. Rockefeller, J. P. Morgan, and Messrs. Reid, Ream, Carnegie, Frick and Moore.

Late today Chairman Gary held a long consultation with J. P. Morgan at his Wall street office and shortly afterwards Mr. Morgan accepted service. Afterwards Messrs. Rockefeller and Reid also were served.
