### Notice to Establish Grade on Curry Street.

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos county, Oregon, did, on the first day of November, 1911, at a regular meeting by resolution duly passed determine to establish the grade on Curry street commencing at the south line of Sixth street where Curry street intersects with Sixth street, then running south to the north line of Eighth street, where Curry street intersects with Eighth street, all in the Woodland Addition to the City of Bandon, Coos county, Oregon, said grade to be established in accordance with the survey of the City Engineer on said Curry street on portion herein described, and which profile of said grade is now on file at the office of the City Engineer in the City of Bandon, Coos county, Oregon, and is open to the inspection of all persons interested therein.

Now, unless a written remonstrance, signed by the owners of TWO-THIRDS of the real property adjacent to and abutting upon Curry street between portions herein described, shall be filed with the City Recorder of the City of Bandon, within TWENTY DAYS from the first date of publication of this notice, the Common Council will pass an Ordinance establishing such grade on Curry street as herein proposed, and between points as herein described in accordance with survey and the profile of the City Engineer as herein mentioned and now on file.
