GROUND IS BROKEN FOR NEW RICHMOND THEATRE

Modern Playhouse to Grace the Thrifty Town Across the Bay; New School Site.

Richmond, October 21.—Ground has been broken for a new theatre that J. Connolly is to build in MacDonald avenue near Fifth street. The playhouse will seat 1,200 persons and will be constructed on modern lines. The building will be used exclusively as a theatre.

The land cost \$8,500. It is one of the lots that were bought a few years ago for from \$500 to \$700. Richmond has several small theatres and one rather pretentious opera house, but the new building will represent the newest in this line of business.

The Board of Education has about decided to accept the beautiful site offered free by John Nicholl for one of the new schools. The site is at Scenic and Buena Vista avenue, commanding a magnificent view and convenient to all the West Side district. There will be some expense in grading it, which the city will bear.
