> -----Rogoway Jurymen Give Up

> > Hunt.

Ashland, Oregon, Nov. 13 - Af ter nearly two weeks' deliberation, the coroner's jury inquiring into the death of N te Rogoway of Albany, Or., reached a verdict this morning. The entire investigations have been held secret, owing to incriminating evidence against persons whom it was thought possible to aprehend. Efforts to locate these persons proved futile, and without their testimony the jury was unable to fix responsibility for the crime. The verdict is as follows:

"The coroner's jury, impaneled to investigate the death of one, Nate Rogoway, whose body was found in the brush eight miles east of Ashland, after\_due investigation. finds Mrs. J. L. Kronenberg entertained the body to be that of Nathan Rogoway, a native of Russia, aged about 23 years, and that he came to his death on or about May 26, 1911. from a gunshot wound inflicted by a party unknown to this jury.'
