Rogoway Jurymen Give Up Hunt.

Ashland, Oregon, Nov. 13.—After nearly two weeks' deliberation, the coroner's jury inquiring into the death of Nate Rogoway of Albany, Or., reached a verdict this morning. The entire investigations have been held secret, owing to incriminating evidence against persons whom it was thought possible to apprehend. Efforts to locate these persons proved futile, and without their testimony the jury was unable to fix responsibility for the crime. The verdict is as follows:

"The coroner's jury, impaneled to investigate the death of one, Nate Rogoway, whose body was found in the brush eight miles east of Ashland, after due investigation finds the body to be that of Nathan Rogoway, a native of Russia, aged about 23 years, and that he came to his death on or about May 26, 1911, from a gunshot wound inflicted by a party unknown to this jury."

This is the same Rogoway for whom L. J. Wheeler of this city was arrested. Mr. Wheeler succeeded in showing that he had no knowledge of the affair, much less to be connected with it.

for street improvement bonds of said city. Said bonds aggregate in amount \$2,200 00. They are issued in denominations of not less than \$25.00 or more than \$500.00.
